NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS

Meeting Minutes Multiple District – 31 Saturday, May 2, 2015, 9:AM Holiday Inn, Wilmington, NC

The North Carolina Lions State Council of Governors met Saturday, May 2, 2015, at 9:AM in the Holiday Inn, Wilmington, NC. Governors present were: David Titus, Sharon Weddington, Norma Jean McKinney, Chris Headley, Lynn McCaskill, Ron Beltran, Carol J. Weeks and Jana Underwood Peedin. Council Chair Ron Kelly presided.

For the record, a State Council work session was held Friday evening, May 1, 2015, beginning at 7:PM and ending at approximately 9:15 PM.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Kelly, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance by Governor Headley and the invocation by Governor McCaskill. Chairman Kelly welcomed the audience and made several remarks about the successful Lions State Convention. He recognized PIP Sid Scruggs and PIDs Harvey Whitley and Lacey Presnell.

PIP Scruggs repeated some of the remarks he made during the Friday evening session, including action from the most recent Lions International Board Meeting. He thanked the Council for their year-long work and asked the incoming Council to seek advice from the Past District Governors and especially the current council in decisions on awards to deserving Lions. He encouraged Lions to work to organize new clubs to stem the downward trend in membership.

PID Whitley congratulated the Council on their year as Governor, expressing appreciation for his NC Lions Hall of Fame recognition. He echoed PIP Scruggs advice, reminding the in-coming council that PID John Petis said that Past District Governors are Lions greatest asset. He said this is especially true in the transition from eight to five districts. He announced that the Governors reimbursement no longer includes office expenses so it may need to be included in the new district budgets. He urged lions to take advantage of the leadership schools and web based training programs for Lions.

PID Whitley encouraged Lions to attend the September 17-19 USA/CANADA Forum in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He said Lions under the age of 30 can attend on a reduced registration and that aniother day of workshops have been added to the forum.

PID Presnell offered encouragement to the next Council of Governors.

There was no communications to be read.

PDG Skippy Jackson was appointed Parliamentarian.

Upon motion of Governor Headley, second by Governor McCaskill, and unanimous vote, the minutes of the February 7, 2015, Council of Governors Meeting Minutes were approved.

The State Council Financial Report covering the period from July 1, 2014 through April 29, 2015 was presented by State Council Secretary-Treasurer Rhett White. He noted that the budget remains tight but that income is exceeding expenditures at this time. Upon motion of Governor McKinney with second by Governor Beltran, the financial report was accepted as presented.

PDG Tim Williams reported on the 92nd NC Lions State Convention in Charlotte, April 24-26, 2015. He characterized the convention as a success.

PDG Herb Justice, Chairperson of the 2016 NC Lions State Convention in Raleigh, April 22-25, 2016, reported on the preliminary convention plans. He noted that with the convention now being held in April there is less time to plan so an accelerated planning schedule needs to be established.

He asked the Council for a \$4,000.00 advance so that a bank account can be established and planning with the hotel can get underway. He noted that this request is usually made to the new Council in August, but is needed earlier because of the earlier convention date. Upon motion of Governor Headley with second from Governor Weeks, the vote was unanimous to advance \$4,000.00 to the Raleigh planning committee from the State Convention Fund.

State Convention Chair, PDG Gwen White, congratulated PDG Williams for managing a successful convention in Charlotte. She said a willing host is needed for the 2017 State Convention. She also said a revamp of the Convention Policy and Procedures is needed.

NC Lions, Inc., President Mike Flora thanked the Governors for their work to fund Brighter Visions and the Camp Dogwood fundraising. He said the volunteer week went well and invited Lions to return for the second camp Dogwood Fun Weekend. He also thanked Anne Metts and her daughter for providing a hospitality room. He reminded Lions that the Budget Caucus will begin at 3:PM, Saturday.

PDG John Owens, State Global Leadership Team Coordinator, reviewed the Governor Training for the in-coming Governors and 1st VDGs. He announced the training schedule for next year and reported that the five new District GLT Chairpersons have scheduled officer training sessions in each of the districts.

PDG Vince Schimmoler, State Global Membership Team Coordinator, said there is still time to get a new Lions Club in each district. He announced that PID Harvey Whitley will be the new State GMT Coordinator.

PDG Ron Staley was recognized to present a State Convention Shirt to PID Whitley who was speaking out-of-state and thus unable to participate in the NC Lions State Convention. He noted that PID Whitley was on the Charlotte Convention planning committee.

There was no unfinished business.

After a short break, Chairman Kelly called the meeting back to order for reports from State Committee Chairs.

There was no report from the Boys and Girls Home Committee.

Lion Harriett Walton, Celebrate Liberty Chair, said she hoped to see more student essays next year, while sharing the state winning essay of Devon Rosenberger. There were several suggestions for ways to secure more entries. She announced that the next Celebrate Liberty pin will feature patriot William Blount of North Carolina and will cost \$1.35 and be sold for \$2.00, if the Council approves. Upon motion of Governor Weddington, second by Governor McKinney, and unanimous vote, the pin purchase was authorized.

PDG Dave Butler, State Constitution and By-Laws Chairperson, reported that the changes in the State Constitution and By-Laws have been incorporated into the official copies of the documents.

Lion Judy Jackson reported on the State Diabetes Program. She said the DAPS program continues to function with UNC-CH still interested in working with the program in Robeson County. She noted that a DAPS video was produced during the Districts G.H

& J Mid-Winter Convention with help from Paul Bledsoe. She said the DVDs are available for \$2 each. She reported that the diabetes work in Fayetteville has netted a new Lions Club and that there will be several STRIDES Walks in Districts 31-F & H, this year. She said the Carthage Lions Club nets \$5,500 annually with a STRIDES Walk.

There was no report from the Historian.

Lion George Culp, State Information and Technology Chairperson, promised the new webs sites will be in operation by July 1st. He urged Lions who want to use social media to keep it short and to the point, noting that users of social media do not have the time to read lengthy posts.

Lion Liz Steele reported on the Leo State Convention and their Stop Hunger Project, thanking several Lions for their help. She said there are currently 29 Leo Clubs and two Campus Clubs with one expected to fold. She said help will be needed from each district to complete the Stop Hunger Project next year with cost now at \$2,900.00 to complete a packaging project.

PDG Carlton Weeks, MD-31 LCIF Coordinator, asked for support to help with Nepal earthquake disaster relief. He also said the NCLF measles initiative continues. attachment # 12

PDG Johnny Berry provided a nominations report. He said he had reviewed the work of redistricting and those elected. He said the five new districts will elect their 2nd VDGs in July.

North Carolina Council of Governors Meeting Minutes Multiple District – 31 Saturday, February 7, 2015, 9:AM Crown Plaza, Charlotte, NC

The North Carolina MD-31 Council of Governors met Saturday, February 8, 2015, at 9:AM in the Crown Plaza, Charlotte, NC. Governors present were: David Titus, Sharon Weddington, Norma Jean McKinney, Chris Headley, Lynn McCaskill, Ron Beltran, Carol J. Weeks and Jana Underwood Peedin. Council Chair Ron Kelly presided.

For the record, a State Council work session was held Friday evening, February 6, 2015, beginning at 7:PM and ending at 11:PM.

Chairman Kelly called the meeting to order and made several comments, noting that MD-31 has lost 623 members since July 1, 2014, and is now under 7,000 members. He encouraged the Governors to work to turn the declining numbers into growth.

He welcomed Lions and guests in attendance and asked Vice-Council Chair Chris Headley to lead the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag. Chaplin Lynn McCaskill offered the invocation.

Recognition of the International Family followed. PIP Sid Scruggs reported that while the United States has lost 4,960 members this year, India has gained 7,000 new members. He cautioned that historically with redistricting there is a dip in membership before there is any increase.

PIP Scruggs reported that items to be considered at the International Convention in June include reinstatement of the office of 3rd Vice-President, reallocation of three International Directors from North America to Asia over a three year period and changing Leadership Department to "Leadership Development." He told the Governors that their request for Presidential and Leadership Medals has been submitted, but noted that since MD-31 is below 7,500 members the full request may not be honored.

PID Harvey Whitley reported that The Lion Magazine will be all-digital January 1, 2018, but to not expect a dues reduction as a result. He said there is already a free Lion Magazine app. He shared the newsletter from PID Naresh Aagerwal who was endorsed earlier in the year by the NC Lions Sate Council for the office of 2nd International Vice-President. He also encouraged Lions to attend the 2015 USA/Canada Forum in Grand Rapids, Iowa, next fall.

PID Lacy Presnell thanked those in attendance for their interest and participation.

There were no communications to be shared. PDG Skippy Jackson was appointed Parliamentarian.

Upon motion of Governor Weddington with second by Governor Headley, the minutes of the November 8, 2014 regular meeting and the November 9, 2014 called meeting of the NC Lions State Council were unanimously approved.

State Secretary-Treasurer Rhett White presented the financial report covering July 1, 2014 through February 4, 2015, noting that revenues are as expected and expenditures are currently lower than anticipated. He said that the second round of dues billings have been sent to the district Treasurers.

After discussion and upon motion of Governor Headley and second by Governor Beltran, the vote was unanimous to accept the financial report as presented.

PDG Tim Williams, Chair of the 2015 Lions State Convention, reported on the upcoming convention in Charlotte, including several corrections to the registration form. He called on the Governors to boost attendance and to sell advertisements for the program. He announced that the State Convention pins are on sale at the Promotions committee table and urged the Governors to complete their registration form before returning home.

State Convention Chair Gwen White and PDG Herb Justice reported that contracts have been signed with the Crabtree Marriott Hotel in Raleigh for the 2016 State Convention. PDG White said 2017 will be a banner year for Lions and she is still looking for a host for that State Convention. She said the International President may be available to attend the Centennial Convention.

North Carolina Lions, Inc, (NCLI) President Mike Flora announced that there would be a NCLI board caucus at 4:PM in preparation for the Sunday Board Meeting. He invited Lions to participate in the May 15-17 Camp Dogwood Fun Weekend, asked Lions to push to make the Brighter Vision drive a success and announced that Matching Funds are running short as the result of increased needs for glasses and eye exams. He said another \$15,000 will be needed to provide Matching Funds through the end of May.

PDG John Owens, State Global Leadership Coordinator, said that the leadership training for District Governors-elect had gone well. He reviewed the fall and winter training schedule and thanked Lions Clubs International for providing \$600 to help cover training cost. He encouraged Lions to take advantage of the webinars, on-line classes and Lions University for club and district training resources. He also said there are regional training opportunities.

PDG Vince Schimmoller, State Global Membership Coordinator, congratulated districts 31-A and 31-E for having positive membership growth. He said unfortunately many clubs have been dropped, He said districts F, J and D are working on new Lions Clubs.

Under unfinished business PDG Dave Butler, Constitution and By-laws Chair, reported on proposed changes to the Policy and Procedures Manual, explaining that the changes were approved at the November Council Meeting and would need final approval at this meeting. He began by explaining and answering questions about the State Free Trading Pin Policy change. Upon motion of Governor Titus, second by Governor

Weddington, the motion to approve the Pin Policy as presented was unanimously approved.

PDG Butler continued by explaining and answering questions about several Policy and Procedure Manual changes to reflect actual administrative practice and new titles. Upon motion of Governor Headley with second by Governor McKinney, the vote was unanimous to approve the changes as presented.

After a break Council Chair Kelly called the meeting back to order and asked if there was any new business. Upon motion of Governor Beltran, second by Governor Titus, the vote was unanimous to appoint PDG Carlton Weeks to another three year term as MD-31 LCIF Coordinator.

Upon motion of Governor Peedin with second by Governor Weddington, PDG Gwen White was appointed to a three year term as MD-31 Centennial Coordinator, term running July 1, 2014 thru June 30, 2018.

PDG Butler returned to the podium to present several proposed Constitution and By-laws changes. He explained that if approved by the Council, the changes would be presented to the delegates at the 2015 Lions State Convention for a vote. He noted that the Lions of North Carolina would have to be given at least a 30-day notice of the proposed changes prior to the convention vote.

PDG Butler provided an item-by-item explanation and review of each proposed change. After explaining and answering questions about Article V changes which would prevent spouses from serving on the same Council, a motion by Governor Peedin, second by Governor McKinney, to send the proposed change to the State Convention for a delegate vote was unanimously approved.

PDG Butler explained that the proposed change to Article VIII would eliminate the special dues that were implemented to help support the candidacy of PID Sid Scruggs through the International Vice-presidency and Presidency. Upon motion of Governor Headley, second by Governor McCaskill, the vote was unanimous to send the proposed change forward for a delegate vote at the State Convention.

PDG Butler explained that Article X, Section 1, is a new section that provides for and defines the District Cabinet as provided in Article VIII, Section 7 of the International By-laws. He explained that Article XIV, Section 1, addresses the make-up of the district budget committees; that Article XVI, Section 2, allows proposed amendments to be advertised by written copy or electronic means, and that Article XVI, Section 3, changes the word Foundation to Incorporated. Upon motion of Governor Beltran, second by Governor Weddington, the vote was unanimous to approve the changes and schedule them for a vote by delegates at the 2015 Lions State Convention in April.

PDG Butler explained proposed changes to clean-up or reflect title changes in the By-laws, Article 1, Sections 3, 4, 7, 10(b), 10(c), 10(f), 10(g), 10(h), 10(i), 10(j), 10(k), 10(m) and 10(n). Upon motion of Governor Peedin with second by Governor Titus,

the vote was unanimous to approve the By-law changes for a vote by delegates at the State Convention.

Next was a new section, Article III, Section 10(r), creating the Diabetes Awareness and LEHP Committee. After explanation by PDG Butler, a motion was made by Governor Beltran with second By Governor McKinney, to recommend the new section for a vote at the state Convention. The motion passed unanimously.

PDG Butler explained Article VI, Section 2, which would allow electronic notification of proposed By-laws changes; also Article VI, Section 3, that changes the word Foundation to Incorporated. Upon motion of Governor Headley, second by Governor Weddington, the vote was unanimous to endorse the changes and schedule them for a vote by delegates to the 2015 State Convention.

PDG Butler then presented language for a Constitutional change that would increase the state dues, either to \$5.00 annually or \$5.50 annually. He noted that there had not been a dues increase since 1995 and that the membership had declined more than 4,000 persons during that time which results in less funds to provide the same administrative services. There was considerable confusion due to the heading of Article VII: State Convention and State Council Fund, which it was noted does not relate to the annual State Convention.

Much discussion followed with concerns about raising dues at the same time of redistricting. Several questions were asked allowing for more discussion.

Governor McCaskill made a motion with second by Governor Weddington, to recommend that a proposal to increase the NC Lions State dues by \$1.50 per year be prepared and presented for a vote by the delegates at the 2015 Lions State Convention. After a voice vote was inconclusive, a show of hands indicated the motion failed by a vote of five no votes and three yes votes.

Reports of Statewide Committee Chairs followed.

PDG Gary Green reported on Boys and Girls Home for Chairman Gary Elliott. He thanked the Lions for support of the Lions Cottage.

Lion Harriett Walton presented the report on Celebrate Liberty and asked for permission to complete the design and order of Celebrate Liberty pins, focusing on the signers of the Declaration of Independence from North Carolina. Upon motion of Governor Weeks, second by Governor McKinney, the vote was unanimous to authorize pin design and order of 500 pins.

Lion Judy Jackson reported on the Diabetes Awareness Peer Support Program (DAPS). She said there is progress on getting the program underway in new communities and said additional training is needed for DAPS leaders. She encouraged the Governors to advertise the DAPS program, then thanked PDG Paul Bledsoe for his support in creating a video production for DAPS use. She also complimented clubs that support the STRIDES Walk for Diabetes.

PDG Howard Wallace, Historian, made another appeal for historical documentation of clubs such as copies of charters and club history books. He also reviewed his efforts to begin cataloging historical information on Camp Dogwood.

Lion George Culp reported on Information and Technology, including work on the websites and readiness for the new district start-ups in July. He announced that two districts currently have on-line meeting technology and will share it with Lions who need such capabilities for committee meetings.

There was discussion about a billboard in Raleigh that features Lions Clubs but has inaccurate web site information. Lion Culp explained that the web site has expired and the existing web sites will be replaced by new web addresses in July. Lion Culp and PID Lacy Presnell volunteered to contact the billboard company to see if a patch could be added with corrected information.

Lion Liz Steele reported that there are now 31 Leo Clubs in the state, but only 15 students have registered for the February 22-24, Leo State Convention at Camp Dogwood. She said help is needed from Lions to pack 10,000 Stop Hunger Now meals during the Leo Convention, beginning at 11:AM, Sunday. She asked Governors to have their clubs plan a Leo program during the month of April which is Leo Awareness Month.

MD-31 LCIF Coordinator and PDG Carlton Weeks announced that 97 grants have come to North Carolina from LCIF since the foundation was organized in 1970, totaling \$2,867,496.40. He urged clubs to support LCIF which has supported North Carolina Lions.

PDG Johnny Berry, Nominations Chair, presented information on the candidates for offices in the NCLI and State Council, noting that some offices are now without any candidate.

An analysis of the attendance reveals 410 Total Reservations; Attendance at Thursday Night's International Family & Leadership Dinner was 44; Golf – 25; Fun Night – 222; Tail Twisters Breakfast – 244; PDG Luncheon – 75; and District Governors Banquet – 362, 44 of whom were 50+ Year Members.

Although I can't give a full report on finances at this time, I can tell you that we made \$1,335.00 on District raffle baskets, \$869.00 on the Tail Twister Raffle tickets, and \$3,902.00 on the Tail Twisters Breakfast Auction.

We will close the books on this Convention as soon as possible, and I will give a full accounting of the finances when we meet in August.







Activities

Website and Redistricting

Webmasters are working on the new websites. Information is beginning to flow to the webmasters. Each District plans to be ready for rollout on July 1.

Issues

Communication via social media begins with good communication between the originator and the Webmaster. When providing information for social media, remember to be brief and to the point. Site visitors are typically seeking information. Consider the number of times that you have personally "googled" something.

Webmasters should expect the information to be presented to them ready to post. Consider the webmaster as the mailperson whose sole responsibility is to deliver your message. One should not expect webmasters to compose the post, but merely "post" the post. If you consider that breaking news is reported by the media after someone behind the scene has actually completed the research and written the article for a newscaster to read to the public.

Short articles and pictures ready for posting can be emailed to the webmaster who has the ability to 'cut-and-paste" even from their cell phone to your website in minutes.

Your district may want to consider splitting the duties so that a focal point in your cabinet is responsible for communications to social media. This individual would be responsible for seeing that the information to be posted is prepared and ready for posting prior to sending to the webmaster. I recommend that the webmaster not be responsible for the determination of what is posted on your district site. Somewhat as a Public Relations persons, all post should be cleared by someone prior to delivery. For example, suppose a person asks; "I'm having a yard sale at my house this weekend, will you post it on the website?" Requests like this need to be funneled to the responsible party for a response. Likewise, valid post should be handled in a similar matter. Suppose someone requests; "Our Lions Club is having a service project next weekend to pack lunches for the soup kitchen in our town." The response might be to please send pictures and perhaps one paragraph.

It is understood that supplying data to these new websites will take some time. In many instances, the information will not even be available until after the rollout. The most glaring example is that some officers will not be elected until sometime in July. In those cases, send your webmaster a place-holder. A good example is "2nd VDG information to be provided by July 15 following his/her election". Once you begin seeing the website post and analyze how they are being perceived, it will become less difficult to get the right news out to social media.

Most importantly, the post should be timely. Visitors to your site should not find posts that happened months or years ago. Rather, they need to see how your district is serving the community now in the immediate future.

What's Next? – Let's work together to make these sites something we are proud of. Statistically, your webmaster can determine the activity on your sites. As we begin to put the processing in place and hone the procedures, management of the sites will be less tedious.

Future Activity:

Interactive Forms on your websites.

Currently you will be able to provide your members links to forms much as you currently do in an email. The initiative is to provide you with the ability to fill in the forms online and submit it to the requestor.

Payments

The committee will research and present findings that will provide districts with the ability to accept payments. This would be beneficial to collecting district goals and even event registrations such as cabinet meetings, awards day, and District Convention registrations.

Newsletter

The standard chosen by the website committee, provides districts with the opportunity to take the posts to your site and 'magically' create a newsletter. More on this later.

The Advocate – Just completed Spring issue.

Recent Activity: Planning for the Summer issue has begun. Please keep those story ideas coming.

Please remind the board that The Advocate is dependent on Lions of NC to be our eyes and ears for stories that inspire others to join our organization. We also encourage all to forward the digital link to their friends and prospective members. Placing read copies in waiting rooms, churches, etc. is a good way to tell our story of We Serve.

Newsletter -

Plans are underway to provide the Lions of NC and others a monthly newsletter that will highlight recent upcoming events.

MD-31 LCI CENTENNIAL COORDINATOR Saturday, May 2, 2015

The goals of LCI are to make sure the world knows that Lionism is 100 years-old in 2017, and to help 100 million people (1 million for every year of Lionism). Thus the Centennial Celebration focus should be service over a period beginning in 2015 and stretching through the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 centennial years.

The years 2015-2018 will also focus on membership development through recruitment of new members and chartering new Lions clubs.

I suggest that North Carolina devote 2015-2016 to getting ready for the Centennial Celebration, and 2016-2017/2017-2018 to celebrating 100 years with new or expanded service activities and with membership growth. That, incidentally, will position MD-31 for four years (2018-2022) to plan and follow with the celebration of 100 years of Lionism in the Tar Heel State.

Activities may include:

- 1. Compile a time-line history of North Carolina Lions for internal publication and general media distribution.
- 2. Compile five histories of each sub-district for District Newsletters publication and general distribution.
- 3. Encourage North Carolina Lions Clubs to use the <u>NC Lions Clubs History</u> to develop and distribute short club profiles, with additional information on services offered by these clubs.
- 4. Assist with organizing at least one new Lions Club in each district during each year of the Centennial Celebration (2017 extends over two governorships).
- 5. Secure a proclamation from the Governor or a resolution from the NC General Assembly, marking the 2017 Centennial of Lions Clubs International.
- 6. Provide a model proclamation/resolution that clubs can use to secure recognition from local governing boards, calling attention to 100 years of Lionism and to the local club's service to the community.

No doubt, there will be other ideas that will come from our clubs and districts as we begin the celebration.

Note that LCI announced last week a membership/new clubs initiative, so we are already being challenged to begin the celebration.
