Council Chairperson Paulette Gasperson called the second meeting of the 2009-2010 North Carolina State Council of Governors to order at 9:00 AM.

District Governor Marti Hill led the Pledge of Allegiance and District Governor David Osborne gave the Invocation.

For the record, the Council met in caucus on Friday evening, November 6, 2009. All eight District Governors were present at the caucus and seven at today's Council of Governors Meeting.

CC Gasperson welcomed all to the second State Council Meeting of the 2009-2010 Lionistic Year.

Governor Hill moved to approve the Agenda for today's meeting; seconded by Governor Walton. Motion passed. (See Attachment A)

CC Gasperson recognized 1st International Vice President Sid L. Scruggs, III for a few remarks. He began by passing around the new Certificate of Appreciation, the Official Pin, which LCI will purchase 10,000 copies, and the new Presidential Medal for the Governors to inspect. As far as appointments to International Convention Committees, he noted that PCC Diane Whitley will be on the Credentials Committee, and PCC Harvey Whitley will continue to serve on the Elections Committee as he did last year. He stated that he is looking for an Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms and also someone to serve on the Nominating Committee. He went on to discuss the room rates, which currently stand at \$300.00, and mentioned that there were a few two bedroom apartments currently available at the same price. He concluded his remarks by reminding us that in April of 2011, LCI will be bringing the International Board of Directors Meeting to Raleigh. North Carolina, he said, is continuing to get allot of attention around the world as he moves up the ladder towards the International Presidency.

CC Gasperson then recognized PID Lacy Presnell who remarked that he was happy to be here and to see all the smiling faces.

State Secretary-Treasurer Kelly read the communications he has received from Lions Clubs International regretting the cancellation of the Charters of four Lions Clubs in MD-31 over the past three months.

Governor David Osborne agreed to serve as Parliamentarian.

Governor Matthews moved to accept the Minutes of the August 8,2009, State Council Meeting as distributed to all District Governors by e-mal and as published on the web site; seconded by Governor Hill. Motion passed.

Council Secretary-Treasurer Kelly presented the State Council Financial Report dated 10/30/09. He stated that the ledger and bank accounts have been reconciled and all bills have been paid. He noted that all dues for the first half of the year had been paid. Under Income he pointed out Line 160-Youth Exchange and stated that four of the eight districts on tribute \$500.00. He ended his report with a review of the Money Market Account.

Governor Henry moved to accept the State Council Financial Report; seconded by Governor Nichols.

Motion passed. (See Attachment B)

Council Chair Gasperson then opened the floor to each of the District Governor come to the podium to discuss the "State of their District." The following is a summary of their comments:

<u>District 31-A:</u> DG Marti Hill reported that her district was getting ready for their Fall Convention. She went on to say that by the end of November she will have visited 44 of her 55 Lions Clubs. Following the Fall Convention she plans to concentrate on building membership. She has made contact with several Motorcycle Clubs with the intent to form a Lions Motorcycle Club. When visiting clubs with all male membership, she said that she emphasized the importance of accepting women into membership. For those clubs that are against admitting women she noted that she will go into their area and actively seek the formation of an all women Lions Club. In closing she noted that she will be scheduling an Extension Workshop for the spring of 2010.

<u>District 31-B:</u> DG Dot Nichols said that she felt that her district was off to a good start. At their Fall Convention, held last week, they elected the incoming officers for next year and had the ID Beverly Stebbins attend their MERL Meeting held on Saturday afternoon. ID Stebbins stated that the MERL Meeting was one of the best she has ever attended. DG Nichols commented that her district was ahead on both White Cane and Camp Dogwood sales and her membership was unchanged year to date. Membership will certainly be emphasized this year, she said, and she noted that she has scheduled an Extension Workshop for March of 2010.

<u>District 31-D:</u> DG David Osborne started his remarks by noting that his district was minus 4 in membership, year to date. An Extension Workshop is scheduled for early 2010 and his emphasis will be on forming both a Latino Club and one or two Campus Clubs in 31-D.

<u>District 31-E:</u> DG Theresa Matthews noted that her district already had a Latino Club and that at the Charter Night for the newly formed Providence Club it was announced that they were forming a Branch Club, the Queen City Branch Lions Club. As a result of this, she said, 31-E's membership is +16. There will be an Extension Workshop for March 21,-23, 2010 for the Belmont Area with Jim Cannon from LCI conducting the sessions.

<u>District 31-F:</u> DG Dan Boudreau said that his district in better than the membership numbers show. It seems that Campus Clubs continue to be difficult to manage. He continues to work with the three new

clubs formed last year so that they remain active in their communities. The "no women barrier" has been broken in two more clubs as he has been emphasizing this important initiative this year. In one of the clubs, the Pembroke Lions Club, membership jumped by 16 new members once this barrier was eliminated, he said. He closed by noting that an Extension Workshop will be held in Angier, NC with the goal of forming a new Lion Club there and one in Broadway, NC.

<u>District 31-G:</u> DG Don Henry noted that his district was in good shape considering that a month after he took office the district membership was a minus 29 and now stands in plus territory. His VDG's are very active, he said, and they are working closely with the Zone Chairs in the areas of membership and retention. He then went on to describe a new initiative called "Feed the Hunger "in which every club in the district will work on this project on the same day. We have 385 million people in the world who go hungry every day, he said, with one dying every three seconds because of lack of food. DG Henry has asked his clubs to assess their members \$0.25 per meeting with the goal of raising \$7,500.00 for this program.

District 31-H: DG Al Greene was ill and did not attend this meeting.

<u>District 31-J:</u> DG Bob Walton stated that his district started off like gang-busters by having an Extension Workshop on August 10, 11 & 12th with Jim Cannon form LCI. This resulted in a new Lions Club in Washington, NC which will charter with 37 members on November 10, 2009. He noted that they were minus 13 last month but with the new club they will be plus 21 new members this month but still in negative numbers year-to-date. He did note that they had one of the most successful VIP Fishing Tournaments in October.

Council Chair Gasperson thanked the District Governors for their reports.

Council Chair Gasperson called upon Lion Curtis Erickson, the 2010 State Convention Chair for his report. Lion Curtis noted that his committee has been meeting bi-monthly. Groundwork has been laid with the Convention Hotel, Crown Plaza Resort in Asheville. PIP Jim Irvin of Georgia will be the Keynote Speaker. Lion Curtis reviewed the Registration Form, Program Ad Form, State Convention Pin, etc. He also requested \$6,000.00 from State Convention Reserves to subsidize room rates.

Governor Walton moved to approve the State Convention Registration Form; seconded by Governor Henry. Motion passed.

<u>Governor Henry</u> moved to approve the State Convention Ad Form; seconded by Governor Nichols. Motion passed.

Governor Matthews moved to approve the State Convention Menus; Seconded by Governor Boudreau. Motion passed.

<u>Governor Hill moved to approve the Official State Convention Pin; seconded by Governor Walton.</u>
<u>Motion passed.</u>

Governor Hill moved to approve \$6,000.00 be taken from the State Convention Reserve account to subsidize room rates thereby reducing the room rate from \$112.00 to \$99.00 per night; seconded by Governor Osborne.

Governor Henry moved to approve the State Convention Schedule of Events; seconded by Governor Hill. Motion passed.

Governor Matthews moved that exhibitors table be priced at \$100.00 with the exception that this fee be waived for Camp Dogwood, The VIP Fishing Tournament, NCLF Pin Sales, and Promotions;

seconded by Governor Boudreau. Motion passed.

Note: The Council of Governors voted yesterday evening at their Caucus that all monies raised at the State Convention Tail Twister Breakfast will go into Sid I. Scruggs, III's Campaign Fund,

Council Chair Gasperson recognized State Convention Committee Chair Joe Silvers who in turn recognized the 2011 State Convention Chair W. Brad Logsdon for his comments. Lion Brad stated that the 2011 State Convention will be held at the Holiday Inn Bordeaux, in Fayetteville, NC, on June 16th through 19th Room rates, he said will be at \$72.00 per night. He noted that his committee has already raised \$6,200.00 in Advertising Sales. Lion Joe Silvers concluded his remarks by stating that the location for the 2012 State Convention has yet to be decided. He did, however, say that he has had conversations with Lion Mike Schwartz of 31-E regarding hosting the State Convention in his area.

Council Chair Gasperson recognized NCLF President John Miller. Lion John stated that the 75th Anniversary of the North Carolina Lions Foundation is off and running and that \$4,000.00 has been raised so far. He encouraged everyone to participate. NCLF, he said, had received \$7,500.00 from the Lake Lure Lions Club to name the Library at Camp Dogwood the Claude Neiland Memorial Library. He stated that the Hearing Aid program be continued with the credits received going into an account for the Deaf Blind Retreat on a permanent basis. He noted that the Properties Committee has completed their review of all the properties at Camp Dogwood. He noted that this past Falls Volunteer Week, organized by Dale & Loraine Dupree, had 29 participants. The Vision Van Program has been stalled with the illness of Mike Howard and eight screening had been missed as a consequence. He went on to review the status of contributions to White Cane, Honorariums and Memorials, and the Camp Dogwood Ticket sales. He closed with discussing a future meeting to put together a Comprehensive Policy Manual for Camp Dogwood.

Council Chair Gasperson requested that Governor Matthews come to the podium to call up the MERL Team for their reports.

Membership: PCC Gary Greene began with a review of where we stood in comparison to last year. He noted that at this point last year, our Lions statewide had recruited 275 new members. This is not inclusive of charter members; these are only the new members recruited to existing clubs. This year, through October, our clubs have recruited 239 members, a 15% drop, so we've still got a lot of work to do. He reviewed the MERL training in Memphis and noted some of the techniques learned at this meeting. In closing, he mentioned the "Lions in Sight" publicity campaign slated for January and directed us to the complete selection of Public relations materials available on the LCI web site.

Extension: PDG Larry Gasperson was unable to attend the Council Meeting. However, he did submit a report and it can be read in the attachments. (See attachment E)

Retention: PCC Harvey Whitley included in his presentation a graphical illustration of our members added versus members dropped through October 2009 that indicated an overall gain of +3 for the period. While this is good, he said, the largest number in six of our eight districts is drops, not members added. He made the point that retention goals can best be achieved at the club level. He closed by saying that if we could reduce overall drops by 10% we would be at +38 instead of +3 while a cut in drops of 50% would give our membership a boost of +177 (See Attachment F)

<u>Leadership:</u> PDG Ron Staley announced that the next training session for the 1st Vice District Governors will at Camp Dogwood on December 4^{th.} 5th & 6th. He noted that, with the advent of the 2nd. Vice District Governor position, he has been attempting to develop a curriculum that would integrate both classifications of Vice District Governors into the current training sessions or perhaps expand the concept to include the District Governor as well. This will necessitate, he said, the need for additional trainers. He concluded his report by describing a proposed NCLF Leadership training School.

Council Chair Gasperson announced a 15 minute break.

Unfinished Business: None

New Business:

Governor Boudreau moved that the State Council approve taking \$8,000.00 from the State Council Reserve Account and that \$1,000.00 be distributed to each of the eight (8) Districts. These funds will then be used to supplement the \$750.00 from each district in seeking a matching \$1,750.00 PR Grant from LCI for use in a Statewide "Lions-In-Sight" TV Ad Campaign in the spring of 2010; seconded by Governor Hill. Motion passed.

Council Chair Gasperson requested that Governor Walton come to the podium and call up the statewide committee chairs for their reports.

Reports of Statewide Committee Chairs:

Boys & Girls Homes of North Carolina: PCC W. Brad Logsdon began his report by describing the energy survey currently underway at Boys & Girls Homes. If the recommendations are followed, he said, it would result in an estimated 60% reduction in utility costs per year. In noting that Boys & Girls Homes has the largest pecan orchard in the State, he said that they have applied for a federal grant to increase the crop in both size and quality. He closed by asking those present to keep in mind the annual spring clean-up day on March 6, 2010. (See Attachment H)

Campus Clubs: PDG Sidney Eudy was unable to attend and did not submit a report.

<u>Celebrate Liberty:</u> PDG Mike Covell was unable to attend the State Council Meeting. However, he did submit a report which was read by Lion Harriett Edmunds. In his report PDG Covell noted that his committee met via conference call on September 22, 2009, Annual Celebrate Liberty pins will be available later this year, he said. The theme for this year is "Veterans." (See Attachment I)

<u>Constitution & By-Laws:</u> PDG John O'Malley noted that his Committee has reviewed the State Constitution & By-Laws and the State Policy and Procedures Manual and is recommending a number of changes: 1 to the Constitution, 6 to the By-Laws and, 9 to the Policy and Procedures Manual. As each of these recommended changes require a separate motion to approve, the changes and the parties making the motion and the second can be viewed in the attachment. (See Attachment J)

<u>Diabetes Awareness:</u> Lion Bill Barnwell began his report by informing the District Governors that in the last four years the diabetic situation has not improved, rather, it has become a global pandemic. In the US, he said, the number of diagnosed cases of type 2 diabetes has increased by 2 million people. He

went on to remind us that November is Lions Diabetes Awareness Month and encouraged us to work with healthcare professionals to implement diabetes awareness programs. (See Attachment K)

Historian: Lion Marlene Wooten was unable to attend and did not submit a report.

Information & Technology: PDG Paul Bledsoe was unable to attend today's State Council Meeting; however, he spoke to the Council during the Friday Night Caucus and did submit a Report. In his report he talked about promoting our Lions Clubs with billboards and TV Advertising throughout the state. He also suggested three (3) easy steps for a successful Lions "In Sight" event. (See Attachment L)

<u>Leo:</u> Lion Terry Cauble gave a report in which he informed the State Council as to what was happening in the Leo Clubs in Districts 31-E, 31-F, 31-G. He also made a request for \$300.00 of the \$500.00 budgeted for the Leos for their State Convention at Camp Dogwood. (See Attachment M)

<u>LCIF:</u> MD-31 LCIF Coordinator PCC Harvey Whitley reviewed the work of Foundation worldwide and reminded us to continue to support LCIF. (See Attachment N)

<u>Lions Alert:</u> PDG Dale Dupree stated that the Lions Alert Team continues to educate the Lions in the state regarding opportunities to serve in disaster relief situations. Programs have been presented to most Districts at their Conventions.

Nominating: PDG Carlton Metts reported on endorsements for 2010-2011. (See Attachment P)

Promotions: PDG Dave Martin will report at the Promotions Committee Meeting.

(Lions) Quest: PDG Morris Van Vleet did not attend and did not submit a Report.

Research/Long Range Planning: PDG Bob Shook was in attendance but did not have anything to report.

<u>Women's Development:</u> PCC Diane Whitley reported that, as of August 31, 2009, that women represent 21% or 274,999 of the 1,318,908 members worldwide. (See Attachment Q)

Youth Exchange: PDG Jerry Mertz reported that he is awaiting information from LCI regarding the number of foreign youth exchange participants for 2010. 1st International VP Sid L. Scruggs, III asked to be recognized and spoke about our not having a Policy Statement regarding foreign coming to the US who have no affiliation with a Lions or Leo Club in their country. He noted that it costs Lions quite a bit of money to feed lodge, and entertain these foreign students while they are here. They should have some connection to a Lions Organization of they should not participate.

A motion was made by Governor Hill to approve the Committee Reports; seconded by Governor Henry. Motion passed.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:54 AM.

Our registration form has been developed and was presented last evening for your approval. The meals represent the prices we have negotiated and are as follows; Fun night celebration \$20.00 per person, Tail Twister Breakfast \$15.00 per person, PDG Luncheon \$15.00, and Governor's Banquet \$28.00. The February Meeting the program will have to be finalized and approved.

We have three tours scheduled to Cherokee, Biltmore House and the Asheville Mall. The Biltmore House cost will be \$38.00 and should be beautiful in May. The tours are on the suggested program. We are also going to have a golf tournament but the price is still under negotiation.

PCC, Lion Dave Butler has designed a State convention Pin and it's on sale for \$5.00 through the Convention committee. We also have a small pin for registration bags. We also will have a nice registration bag filled with goodies.

In summarization the State Convention committee needs approval on the following items to get the ball rolling. Registration form, program ad form, menu for meals, price of table rental and approval to waive fees for organizations mention, approval for Council Chair PDG Paulette Gasperson to fill in the blanks left on the Program.

All the committees are set at our district level and working hard to make this a great Lions convention. We are well on to the path to make this happen.

The committee members and I thank you for the opportunity to serve and work on this State convention. If we are missing any details please let us know.

Membership Committee Report PCC Gary Greene Chair

Where are we now? Well, we've still got a lot of work to do. Last year at this point, our Lions statewide had recruited 275 new members. This is not inclusive of charter members; these are only the new members recruited to existing clubs. This year through October, our clubs have recruited 239 members, a 15% drop. At the very least, our existing clubs should be holding their own.

Your district chairs are active for you. Most of them have made membership presentations and we have support statewide for club membership nights. Your district membership chairs have set a goal to personally recruit 24-40 members as a group; several have successfully recruited new members and are on their way to meeting this goal.

The MERL training in Memphis has given us additional tools to share with the district chairs and clubs. We heard about the time-tested tactic of clubs hosting open houses. Some of the more intriguing ideas that are not widely used include a membership campaign where all of the club members are simultaneously recruiting new members as part of a singular effort. You can take this a step further by having a competition between club members or between teams for the successful recruitment of new members. An interesting tactic not often used is the recruitment of new members for a particular project. You identify the resources your club needs to undertake a new effort and then recruit members with the skills to meet that need.

An additional tactic is to undertake a publicity campaign for your club and we are seeing President Wirfs making this a priority for Lions everywhere in January. He is asking clubs to showcase their favorite service project. There's a complete selection of Public Relations materials available from Lions International to help with this. Emails went out earlier this week from our international president to let us know about this program.

Next Steps

- Communicate the successful membership tactics learned from the MERL training to our district chairs.
- Write an article for our Lions newspaper to accentuate the January publicity campaign.
- Continue to encourage our district chairs in their club presentations, personal membership recruitment, and leadership for new members.

Immediately following the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Memphis Tn, along with the rest of the MD31 MERL team I attended the LCI MERL Workshop.

There we were exposed to the various types of Leadership styles, instructed as to goal setting, developing action plans, etc.

In the extension part we discussed the LCI Extension Workshops, the different types of Clubs that could be chartered and the enthusiasm that is generated throughout the District & Multiple District. Also how the techniques learned in the workshops can be used to revitalize existing clubs. We all know about the continuing decrease in membership throughout the state. We also know that the way to turn those numbers around is through extension-creating new clubs in communities where there are no Lions Clubs, creating additional clubs in the larger communities that can support multiple clubs.

My goal for Statewide Extension is at least 2 new clubs in every district. This can include the Traditional clubs, Branch clubs, Campus clubs, New Century clubs, Cyber clubs & Special Interest clubs.

I know some Districts have already scheduled a LCI Extension workshop & some Districts have a workshop scheduled after the first of January, 2010 District H held a workshop in Oct and will probably have 3 new clubs, District J held a workshop in Aug and chartered a Branch club, since then

have converted it into a full club.

District D continues to work on a Campus Club & a Latino Club.

District B has an Extension workshop scheduled in March, 2010

District A is diligently searching for an area to hold an extension workshop.

Retention Committee Report MD 31 Council of Governors November 7, 2009 Clemmons, NC

As part of my report this morning, I have included a graphical presentation of our members added versus members dropped through October 2009. As has already been reported, we had an overall gain of +3 for this period. That is great news! However, take a look at the chart and what do you see? The largest number in 6 of our 8 districts is drops, not members added. If you were running a business and this reflected your employees hired and employees dropped would this be a major concern that you would want to aggressively address?

In my last report, I made the point that retention goals are best achieved at the club level. Each club needs a club retention chairperson who will assure that drops are addressed. Each club needs to do a self evaluation as to how they can improve their retention. As District Governor, I hope that you are addressing this need when you make your club visit. If you are not, please add that to your remarks.


Reducing drops is not an easy job. As I have told my district retention chairs, reducing drops is like eating an elephant, you do it one bite at a time. We will never be able to reduce drops to zero, but we need to be working toward a set goal in every district.

What if we had been able to reduce our overall drops by just 10% so far this year? We would be at +38 instead of +3. A reduction of only 20% in drops would put us at +73. If we had cut the drops by 50%, we would be at +177.

Improved retention can be, must be and will be a major factor to our reaching the 10,000 members we are aiming for by the end of 1st VP Sid's term as an executive officer.

BOYS AND GIRLS HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

We could all take a tip from the Boys and Girls Homes (BGH); they are in the process of conducting an energy survey. The annual power bill for BGH is \$188,000, if a 20% savings could be achieved it would amount to a lot of money.

A team of retired engineers are taking on this project, partially funded by Progress Energy. By annualizing peak usage times, where and how power is being used opens up to ideas for change. If the recommendations are followed, such as changing fixtures, ballasts and bulbs we could see an estimated 60% reduction in utility costs or \$112,800 per year. Then the next big question is how do we pay for the changes? No, we are not going to ask for your donations, federal grant money might be available for energy conservation.

One example where immediate savings could be made was in the gym, by turning off a bank of lights that surround the perimeter could yield an annual savings of \$5,000 and not reduce the lighting on the gym floor.

An unknown fact, BGH has the largest pecan orchard in the state of North Carolina. Over the years the trees have seen little attention. With the size and age of the trees the NC Department of Agriculture has taken an interest in providing advice on what and how to make the improvements necessary to increase the crop in both size and quality. Yes, a federal grant has been applied for to cover the expenses of trimming, fertilizing and harvesting.

The above are just a few of the things going on at the Homes to reduce costs and generate additional income.

Last month we held the "Lions Open House" with 25 Lions attending, learning about some of the campus activities, having the opportunity to ask questions and tour the campus. We then had lunch with eight of our boys in the Lions Cottage. A big THANKS need to go out to Governor Dan for the great job he did in cooking the hot dogs and hamburgers.

Have you started making notes and appointments for 2010? We all can look forward to the annual spring clean-up work day on March 6, 2010 with a huge turnout (last year 60 Lions attended). Keep your calendar open and mark the date, will be there?

Quarterly Council Update

Celebrate Liberty Committee

The Celebrate Liberty Committee met via conference call on September 22, 2009. Based on the late start in reaching consensus on the goals for the year, several changes were agreed upon during that call. First, the goal to implement a district and statewide essay contest for 11th graders this year has been revised to establish a process for this project this year to be implemented during the next school year. Factors affecting this decision was the time needed to get participation from high schools in the districts so that essays could be evaluated and winners selected before the fall/ mid-winter conventions for each district. In the last four years, the diabetic situation has not improved, but has become a global pandemic. In the US, the number of diagnosed cases of type 2 diabetes has increased by about 2 million. In NC in 2008, there was 9.3% of the population with diagnosed diabetes (643,000), another 232,000 were estimated to have undiagnosed diabetes.

There were an estimated 376,000 adults with prediabetes in the state. Altogether, an estimated 1.25 million adults in NC have some form of hyperglycemia.

At the July, 2009 meeting the LCI board of directors revised board policy regarding Lions diabetes screenings to provide further guidelines for Lions involved with diabetes screenings, including partnering with healthcare professionals and adhering to appropriate laws and regulations that are in effect for the locations where screenings are held. The new policy is:

"Lions clubs shall be encouraged to partner with healthcare professionals to carryout joint diabetes screening projects as a suggested activity as well as combining a test for diabetic retinopathy with glaucoma testing whenever such an activity is undertaken. Lions should adhere to the appropriate healthcare laws and regulations that are in effect for their jurisdiction when conducting healthcare screenings. Many healthcare regulations require any blood tests to be conducted by a licensed healthcare professional.

November is Lions Diabetes Awareness Month! All Lions are encouraged to work with healthcare professionals to implement diabetes awareness programs. November 14 is World Diabetes Day with the theme "Diabetes Education and Prevention"

Again let me remain you, world wide we now have 250 million people affected. It

is projected by 2025, 380 million people will be affected. At least 50% of the people with diabetes are unaware of their condition. In some countries the figure may reach 80%. Education and awareness are the tools we need to use to slow the spread of diabetes.

From the information received from a great source, it is my understanding that the vinyl is around \$300 per board from LCI contacts. This would be probably be in line with Camel City's approximate quote shown above.

There is available for each district a matching PR grant. I know you have the information and keep in mind it is available with a click to the internet.

During the fiscal year, a district governor can submit a request to have his/her top project publicized (medium or best exposure), utilizing a Public Relations Matching Grant (up to US\$1,750 per year). Districts that received PR grants in previous fiscal years but did not file after-action reports are ineligible.

The Public Relations Matching Grant program is designed to assist districts with their external communications program. Specifically, the program has been developed to facilitate the promotion of Lions programs and activities in district communities. Under this new program, districts may apply for a US\$1,750 grant from Lions Clubs International for their promotional/advertising needs. This grant must then be matched with an equal or greater amount by the respective district.

Ex. 8 NC Districts- 8 X \$3,500.00= \$28,000 statewide dollars.
