Lions Clubs International Multiple District 31 North Carolina Lions State Council Official Minutes

Holiday Inn Crabtree Raleigh, North Carolina Saturday, November 8, 2003 9:00 AM

Council Chairperson Diane B. Whitley called the November Meeting of the 2003-2004 North Carolina State Council to order.

District Governor Roy Jernigan gave the Invocation and District Governor David C. Boyd led the pledge of allegiance. CC Whitley welcomed all Lions and Guests to the meeting.

For the record, the Council met in caucus on Friday evening, November 7, 2003. All of the nine District Governors were in attendance. The following Governors were in attendance for the Saturday morning meeting:

PID Sid Scruggs reported on the North American Summit regarding Lionism in North America. He stated that we were in trouble in North America, with both Canada and the United States losing members faster than we can recruit. Australia has now surpassed Canada in membership. The Impact teams have not stemmed the tide. The emphasis this year will be to strengthen the MERLO Teams. We must consider redistricting since our membership has dropped below 9900 Lions making all nine districts in transition. The average club size in MD31 is 24.8 members while surrounding states enjoy much higher numbers. Dr. Lee emphasizes recruitment of women as a move to increase membership. Women make up 53% of the population but only 13% of lions membership. Entrance fees are dropped for women applying for membership though June 30, 2004. The advantages are manifold since women are making strides in corporate management, and we should also make use of their skills in Lionism. The proposed move to disband clubs of 10 members or less was determined to be unconstitutional.

PID Sid proposed a Resolution to Endorse PID Jimmy Ross, of Texas, for the office of 2nd Vice President of Lions Clubs International. DG David Boyd made the motion for the Council of Governors of MD31 to endorse PID Jimmy Ross for the office of 2nd Vice President, seconded by DG Sid Harbison.

Motion Passed Unanimously.

PID Sid reported on the status of **Past President Bill Woolard**, asking that all Lions send cards of encouragement. CC Whitley reported that **VDG Alan King**, **D31-F**, also had surgery and was unable to attend the Council Meeting.

CC Whitley reported that **South Eastern Guide Dogs** had to retract their invitation of a paid visit in January to their facility in Palmetto FL, due to a budget shortfall. It was hoped that they would still be able to extend the invitation at some later date, during this Lionistic year.

DG Warren Miller made a motion to accept the Minutes of the August 9th Council Meeting; seconded by DG Roy Jernigan. <u>Motion Passed</u>

CC Whitley called on PCC John B. Wall, 2002-2003 State Secretary-Treasurer, to present the Audited 2002-2003 State Council Final Financial Report. The auditor stated that all finances are in order and that the tax forms were properly filled out and mailed. DG Roy Jernigan moved that the audited Financial Report be accepted; seconded by DG Warren Miller.

Motion Passed. (See attachment "A").

CC Whitley called on SST Ohm to present the November 5, 2003 Financial Report. SST Ohm presented the report and explained the notes on income and expenses. DG Frank Brooks moved to accept the November Financial Report; seconded by DG David Boyd.

Motion Passed. (See attachment "B")

CC Whitley noted that the Council had not approved the payment of expenses to send the MERLO team to attend training at the USA/Canada Forum. DG Sid Harbison moved to approve the payment of expenses of the MERLO Team members that attended the training at the USA/Canada Forum; seconded by DG Frank Brooks.

Motion passed.

SST Ohm reported on the status of the **South Eastern Leadership Institute** that will be held at Camp Dogwood on April 22-29,2004. The present institute led by PDG Beverly Roberts, Georgia, will provide all curriculum and instructors. Plans are to invite Emerging and Senior Lions from surrounding states to attend the Institute. Invitations will be sent to all District Governors in January, to select candidates to attend. LCI will pay one half of the cost of the institute with the remainder paid by MD3 I as the host Council.

CC Whitley called on SST Ohm to read a Resolution to Endorse PID Sid L. Scruggs III, for the office of 2nd Vice President of Lions Clubs International. DG Frank Brooks made the motion that the Council of Governors of MD31 endorses PID Sid L. Scruggs III for the high office of 2nd Vice President of Lions Clubs International; seconded by DG David Boyd.

Motion Passed Unanimously.

Following the vote, PID Sid thanked the Council for their support, and advised that he has formed an election committee with two representatives in each district. He cautioned however, that any campaigning must be limited to within the state for the time being. He has also assured LCI that if he were asked to delay or step down, North Carolina had a candidate for Director if so desired by LCI.

NCLF President John J. O'Malley reported that they are working on the plans for the VIP Sensory Garden and it should be finished in time for the 2004 camping season. Pavers are still needed and are being ordered in groups of 100 each. A new brochure listing all of the service programs of the Foundation is available from Camp Dogwood. This brochure can be used to inform Lions and non-lions alike of what Lions in North Carolina are doing. Architectural drawings are being drawn up prior to asking for bids to replace the current Belk dorm with a new 14-room building. Construction should take 9 to 12 months.

Executive Director Steve Walker advised of the dedication of the NC Lions Diabetic Eye Care Center at UNC on Sunday at 2:00 PM. He distributed to the Governors a brochure written by Sandy Lazenby detailing the 2003 camping season at Camp Dogwood. PID Scruggs suggested that this brochure be added to the NCLF Website for all Lions to Download. The report is quite lengthy and contains many color photographs, which will slow downloading. If Districts or Clubs desire multiple copies they should call Camp Dogwood.

PDG John Miller III, Board Member of the NC Commission for the Blind, reported that PID Ron Huber was appointed to another 3-year term as Chairman of Public Information Committee for the Commission. PID Ron has sent information to each Governor to add to District Newsletters to introduce the Commission for the Blind to the grass roots Lions. PDG Miller advised that the VIT Education Program at NC Central University, the only facility to teach VIP Teachers, which was floundering, is now near fully staffed and the program tenured. He read a letter from John Deluca, stating that he was leaving his post as Director of Division of Services for the Blind, and expressed his appreciation for the friendships formed with the Council of Governors, the Foundation, and the Lions of North Carolina during his 10-year tenure.

2004 State Convention Chair PDG Brad Logsdon reported plans for the 2004 Convention that will be held in Fayetteville, NC on March 4-7, 2004 at the Holiday Inn Bordeaux. The Lions of District 31-F are working hard to put on a great convention.

Planned activities include an International Night on Thursday, when we will host our Convention Speaker, International President T.S. Lee and his wife, Haing-Ja from Seoul, Republic of Korea. An authentic Korean dance group comprised of local talent will perform. A Golf Tournament is planned for Friday morning. Friday Fun Night will include a Parade of International Flags with background music, and entertainment from a bluegrass group, a juggler, and the 82nd Airborne Chorus. No meal is planned, however an ice cream dessert bar will be available. Saturday will include the Tail Twister's Breakfast and Auction and the Liberty Day celebration at the Airborne Museum. Weather permitting, The Golden Knights Parachute Team has been asked to parachute onto the courtyard of the Museum and deliver the colors for the Convention. The District Governor's Banquet will complete the Saturday events. The Sunday program will open with the Service Of Remembrance, followed by a reception to greet the newly Elected District Governors afterward.

Chairman Brad expressed a concern that there may be an expense over run for the convention. It was suggested that the Tail twisters Breakfast and Auction be split between convention expenses and White Cane. After considerable discussion it was decide that these proceeds should go only towards programs and services, and not to subsidize the convention.

DG Paul Smith moved that the proceeds of the Tail Twisters Breakfast and Auction be used for White Cane; seconded by DG Roy Jernigan.

Motion Passed.

Chair Logsdon reported that the committee decided not to purchase a Specialty Christmas Ornament for the convention.

Chair Logsdon stated that planned Liberty Day Program will incur extra expenses over previous years, including rental of chairs, an additional security guard and transportation. He has asked individual Districts to help with additional funds and requested an additional \$1000 from the Council for the Liberty Day Fund. DG Roy Jernigan moved that the Council transfer an additional \$1000 to the Liberty Day Fund to provide for the extra expense for Liberty Day at the State Convention: seconded by DG Sid Harbison.

Motion Approved

Chair Logsdon has photos of all District Governors and the International Family for the Convention Program, however he asked VDG photos as soon as possible. Programs will go to the printers January 1st.

He described a convention pin that will be included in each registrant's packet along with the State Trading Pin. The pin is designed with crossed American and South Korean Flags with the Lions Logo and MD31 –2004. A limited edition 2004 Convention Patch will also be available.

Names of Deceased Lions for each district must be submitted at the February meeting for the Service of Remembrance. Governors should also bring their banners to the February meeting.

DG Harbison moved and DG Miller seconded to approve the 2004 State Convention plans to date.

Motion approved. (See attachment "E")

DG David Boyd moved to charge a fee of \$150 for each exhibitor that will want tables or space at the convention; seconded by DG Frank Brooks.

Motion approved

PDG James Sasser, Statewide Convention Committee Chair, reported for D.C. "Ivey" Iverson, that plans are continuing for the 2005 State Convention to be held at the North Raleigh Hilton Hotel, May 26-29, 2005. The hotel contract has already been signed, with room rates at \$69.00 per night.

Convention Chair Sasser again stated on the difficulty in finding sites for 2006 Convention.

DG's David Boyd and David L. Rhoads commented that they would try to have a proposal from the Hilton Hotel in Greenville by the next meeting in February.

PDG Martha Butler reported on D31-A's activities for Elida Homes. In 1969 they built a Lions Cottage at Elida Homes, and since 1982 they have raised over \$800,000 from their annual auction. In 2000 the cottage was renovated with matching funds from LCIF and has been certified as a level 4 care facility for mentally and physically disabled children.

MERLO Team

Leadership Development Chair PDG Bob Moorehead stated that two training sessions have been scheduled for VDG's at Camp Dogwood. Letters will be sent to all VDG's announcing the December 5-7 session, a second session will be held in February. Training is also scheduled for VDGE's on May 14-15, (See Attachment "M")

Membership Committee Chair PDG Butch Coley reported that as of September, MD31 - North Carolina has shrunk to 396 clubs with a membership of 9851 indicating that all nine districts are essentially in transition. We are losing more members that we gain. For this current year we have added 169 members, but have dropped 221 with a net loss of 52. 1. He stressed that the VDG's who are charged to chair the district MERLO teams should call regular meetings of the teams in the districts. 2. He stressed using the tools supplied by International are indeed not being used at the club level. 3. We must innovation to approach each district's unique nature to grow our clubs; no single method will work in every instance.

Chair Coley recommended that the Vice Chairman of the Council be appointed as the chairman of the MERLO Team. DG Sid Harbison moved to name Vice Chairman DG David Boyd as the Chairman of the MERLO team, seconded by DG Frank Brooks.

Motion Approved.

Retention Committee Chair Jim Caudle indicated very little cooperation from district MERLO teams. He feels that this inactivity is hampering our efforts to stem the tide of drops. He suggested that each MERLO team be given the LCRI, Alabama Plan, a power point program to use. (See attachment "N")

CC Whitley proposed to have a state training session for MERLO Team members, both state and district, if possible this year, or perhaps early in the next summer for next year's MERLO team. PDG Coley suggested that training schedules be set up for groups of say three districts to minimize travel and optimize attendance of club team members. PID Scruggs suggested that each District should have a CD of the power point program for MERLO Training distributed at the USA/Canada Forum. He promised to mail out copies to those who didn't get a copy. CC Whitley charged the MERLO Team to develop recommendations.

Promotions Committee Chair PDG J. Clarence Williford deferred his report to the Promotions Meeting immediately following the Council Meeting.

Youth Outreach Chair PDG Jim Irvin commented that the duties of the committee for Youth Outreach are not readily defined. He noted that Lions Quest was probably the largest program of Youth Outreach in Lionism. He reviewed some of our past experiences with Quest and noted that Lions Clubs International is emphasizing Quest for educating children on drugs and substance abuse. Lion Diane Shearer commented the superiority of Quest overt the more popular SAD & MAD programs in use in most school districts. Chair Irvin quoted a new pricing schedule for Quest materials that may make the program more attractive. He noted that the Council has four direct interacting programs with youth: Leo clubs, Peace Posters, Quest, and Youth Exchange.

Council Chair Position (Ad Hoc) Chair PDG Brad Logsdon reported that after studying 52 Multiple Districts in North America, the consensus of the committee was not to change the current policy of MD31. The current policy allows the District Governors the Option to select a Chairperson from either their Council or a Past District Governor. (See Attachment "S")

Investment Committee member DG David Boyd reported the actions of NCLF Investments Committee, which met on Friday, Nov. 7th. The Committee voted to remain with the current portfolio managers.

They decided to move \$200,000 from the cash account to the Allegiance Capital Managed Account. The investment portfolio is balanced at 60% stocks and 40% fixed income.

DG Roy Jernigan moved and DG Frank Brooks seconded to accept the Committee Reports as given. Motion approved.

2004 Convention Chair PDG Brad Logsdon reported Ad sales of \$6324, which qualifies the committee for the additional \$2000 payment from the Council. SST Ohm presented the check to Chairman Logsdon.

CC Whitley stated that the Council of Governors would discontinue the Governor's Challenge awards as they duplicate the International President's Growth Plan awards for membership recruitment.

CC Whitley discussed continuing the practice of inviting the Council Chairman from MD31 - South Carolina and his spouse to our State Convention and asked for a motion to that effect.

DG Frank Brooks moved to invite the Council Chairman and Spouse and pay their expenses to the State Convention in Fayetteville; Seconded by DG Sid Harbison. Motion approved.

PDG Jim Caudle stated that the entire SC Council will attend and hold their Council meeting at the District 31-A Fall Convention in Ashville.

CC Whitley asked all of the VDG's to decide upon and list their convention locations and dates for the 2004-2005 Lionistic year.

CC Whitley noted that she had received a request from Colorado Lions for a copy of the MD31 Constitution and By-Laws. **DG David Boyd moved and DG Warren Miller seconded a motion to send a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws to Colorado Lions.** <u>Motion approved.</u>

CC Whitley mentioned that the Council had not come to a conclusion regarding a proposal to blend one district into three existing districts as a stepwise move towards redistricting. DG Warren Miller moved that the Council forward the proposal to the Long Range Planning Committee for study; seconded by DG Roy Jernigan. Motion approved.

The next Council Meeting will be held in Fayetteville at the Holiday Inn Bordeaux on February 7 & 8, 2004.

CC Whitley expressed the thanks to the Governors and spouses for manning the hospitality room during this session.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 PM

Gentlemen:

I have compiled the accompanying statement of cash receipts and disbursements of Multiple District 31 Lions International – North Carolina for the year ended June 30, 2003.

The accompanying financial statement has been prepared on the cash basis of accounting. Under that basis, the only asset recognized is cash, and no liabilities are recognized. All transactions are recognized as either cash receipts or disbursements, and noncash transactions are not recorded. The cash basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because account receivable from customers, inventory, fixed assets, accounts payables to vendors, and long-term debt are not included in the financial statements.

Management has elected to omit substantially all of the disclosures ordinarily included in a financial statement prepared on the cash basis of accounting. If the omitted disclosures were included in the financial statement, they might influence the user's conclusions about the Company's cash receipts and disbursements. Accordingly, this financial statement is not designed for those who are not informed about such matters.

A compilation is limited to presenting in the form of financial statements information that is the representation of management. We have not audited or reviewed the accompanying statement of cash receipts and disbursements and, accordingly, do not express an opinion or any other form of assurance on it.

NCLF President's Report To N.C. Lions Council Of Governors

November 9, 2003

District Governors, Past International Officers, Vice District Governors, Fellow Lions. At the moment all is well in the world of Lionism in N.C., with the exception of the damage done to coastal areas by Isabel and I know the District Governors are on top of those problems.

The VIP Sensory Garden should be ready for the next camping season, we must order the pavers in groups of 100 and we have orders for about 250 at this time.

At the end of October we took delivery of our new Brochure listing the "Service Programs of the North Carolina Lions Foundation". This brochure outlines with a brief description the services we provide thru our WHITE CANE drive each year. We have plenty of these brochures available to pass out to Lions or Non-Lions so be sure to contact the Foundation Office to get what you need for distribution.

As you know we are planning to demolish the current Belk Building and replace it with a 14 room Building as approved by our Board of Directors and the Lions of North Carolina. We are currently waiting for working plans from our architect then we will put the job out for bid, which should take 30 days. Next we will review the bids and select the builder and then meet with him to go over the construction schedule (which should take from 9 to 12 months). As a result we will not have the use of the Belk Building facilities for next camping season.

It was stressed that clubs should continue to strive to meet their governor's goals, It is important also to stress the Coleman Cates Award.

Only 72 youth can be served under the current residential program at the Home. The needs far exceed the Homes' ability to serve this population. Today, 135 children are

being served through the Joster Care program. The need for this program will continue to grow. Foster parents are urgently needed to be recruited and trained. The Emergency Care Center is now in progress and will be able to serve 20 people at one time. The center is operating at 85% capacity in all programs.

Fund raising ideas were discussed and will be taken to the various districts. Ideas for a statewide fundraiser are still being explored.

Our contributions are running behind last year's at this time. Your Chairman will receive a printout soon as to how your district has done.

Everyone involved at Boys and Girls Homes were saddened recently by the death of Vice President for Finance, Jeffrey W. Spivey. Jeff, as he was known around campus, was employed at the home since October 1, 1983. He was hilled in an automobile accident as he traveled home from work on October 3, 2003 He was a graduate of University of South Carolina/Coastal Carolina with a Bachelor of Science in Accounting. He formerly served in the U.S. Air Force in Obinawa. He was a member of Beulah Baptist Church were he served as a Deacon and Sunday School Teacher. In addition to his work as chief finance officer for Boys and Girls Homes, Jeff will be remembered for his participation in various Civic Clubs. Memorials may be made to Boys and Girls Homes.

Boys and Girls Homes learned recently that Vice President for Resource Development, Allan "Al" J. Martin would be leaving the Homes in a career advancement move. Al was recently honored as a five year employee, having come to the homes in 1998 from Cleveland, Ohio, were he worked in various marketing positions. In charge of development for the Homes, Al frequently worked with civic clubs to encourage their support for the work of the Homes. Al enjoyed hosting different Lions groups when they came on compus to visit the Lions Cottage.

As a haven for young men, the Lions Cottage continues to play an important part for those who come to the Homes due to family concerns. Lets do our part to support the needs of the cottage. It is a privilege to share in the goal to make a difference in the lives of the eight young men who live there.

Council, I want to thank you for allowing me to serve in this position. Even though I was not your first choice I will give you my best effort in improving the retention of our membership.

I want to emphasize that the DISTRICT MERLO TEAMS are not all functioning as they should be and are therefore hindering the improvement of our efforts to change the trend of loosing members due to drops.

Since September I have attempted to contact all nine district retention chairs through e-mail and letters with little success. All nine have e-mails and I have asked for replies or comments to information I have sent them. I have only received replies from four retention chairs; B, C, G, & J.

I have asked them to contact the clubs in their district to arrange visitations for a program. I emphasize calling the clubs for a quicker response, letters are often ignored. I requested the time and dates of their MERLO TEAM meetings so I could visit them but have received none. I have asked them to become more involved. I have sent them information on material available from LCI on the President's Retention Campaign. A list of this material is at the end of this report. I have emphasized the importance of retention and that they should remind the clubs of the Redistricting possibility if we continue loosing members. I have sent the current CUMULATIVE REPORTS ON MEMBERSHIP to inform them of our membership standing. I have asked for a report prior to this meeting on visitations to clubs. I have asked them for current drop status in their districts.

The following are the reports for the nine districts:

Due to the time factor I was unable to receive another sample, but I have been assured by Curt Barnhill that the order will have the correct color. He has told me that the pins should arrive by December 1st. I am proud of the detail in the insignia; he has done an excellent job with it. I will be glad to take pre-orders for anyone wishing to have 20 or more. I already have orders for 100. The pins will sell for \$2.00 each.

Liberty Day Celebration: On October 18th, members of the Liberty Day Committee met with State Convention Chair Brad at the Air Borne and Special Operations Museum. Before our meeting we were taken on a guided tour of the facility. Fellow Lions, I must say that this is an impressive facility and will be an excellent location for this year's celebration. The preliminary plans are to start the celebration at 2:00pm on the Saturday of the convention. Depending on the weather, the program will be held outside on the front lawn. If the weather moves us inside we will hold the program in the facilities theater, which will hold 250 people. We expect to have any were from 250 to 350 attendees. And let's not forget that we have a candidate for International 2nd Vice President. All of these things together make this an excellent opportunity for us to shine. As with most anything this event will take several important things: hard work, time, and like most other things money. We plan on getting as many things as possible donated, but there will plenty of things we will have to buy or rent. We will need items such as: chairs, tables, food, a security guard, and programs printed. During our meeting we decided to ask the council and the individual districts to help with the costs. Each district

Women's Membership Development and Participation Chairperson Report

November 8, 2003 By: PDG Martha Butler, Chairperson

Since we last met in August, your District Chairpersons and I have received some information from Lions International to help us get this new committee established (I understand we can expect to receive more information as it is developed). We are beginning to get organized. At 3:30 this afternoon, we will hold our first Statewide Committee Meeting and we invite you, the Council of Governors and other interested Lions, to attend and share your thoughts. We will be discussing how we can interest more women in becoming members. Also how we can help in retaining the female and male members we already have. I truly believe that the more new members, and the not so new members, know about Lionism and how we serve as Lions the better Lions they will be. The better informed members are, and the more they are made to feel wanted and needed, the longer they will remain Lions.

To this end, we plan to work closely with our District MERLO Teams, as well as the Guiding Lions in our districts to insure that new female and male members become well informed. Both Districts B and C held special seminars at their conventions drawing attention and generating interest in the growth of women as Lion members. As of May 31, 2003, Female Lions only made up 16.74% of our total membership in North Carolina.

Our lions clubs have made many changes over the years, and we must continue to make changes in order to meet the needs of the less fortunate. One change in process, but still not fully accepted, is inviting women to become members. Many clubs have accepted this change, but certainly not all clubs. Our International President Dr. Tae-Sup Lee has asked that clubs accept this change now. After all, when someone needs our help they don't care if the hand held out to them is male or female. As you know, there is no better feeling in the world than the feeling we get inside when we help others. We, as a committee, are asking you to encourage the members in your districts to share this feeling with the women in your communities. Lions clubs need to grow their membership not for the sake of numbers, but for the sake of those in our communities that need our help.

I feel sure that the new incentives the International Board approved in October will help in our recruitment of more Women Lion Members, but only if we Lions invite them to join. I challenge you and all our fellow lions to invite women into your clubs. We became Lions Because Lions Serve the Blind, Visually Impaired, Hearing Impaired and Needy in our communities. When male and female Lions see each other, not as men and women but as Lions, we will grow our clubs. When this change is fully accepted, there will be more Lions, Loving Individuals Offering Needed Services, as we follow our motto "We Serve".

COUNCIL CHAIR POSITION REVIEW

Committee Meeting: August 9, 2003

Our committee meet with six (6) of the nine (9) members present. The pros and cons of the Council Chair position was discussed.

We reviewed 52 Multiple Districts in North America; 45 of the Multiples have a non-sitting governor as their chair. The seven (7) Multiples with sitting governors as council chair, five (5) showed substantial loss of membership.

Each of the members of the committee was charged with contacting two multiples to discuss their policy; how their decision was made and several questions were asked (example attached).

In conclusion, the consensus of our committee was <u>not</u> to change the policy Multiple District 31 has established. The policy allows each <u>sitting</u> Council of Governors the OPTION to select a Chair from their council or select a past district governor to serve as Council Chair.

1- Type of Council Chair

Can be either

Usually is a sitting Governor, but can and has been a PDG.

2- If PDG how selected

Selected from the previous years council.

There is no election for a PDG to serve as CC except by vote from within the Council. If the CC is a PDG then his or her expenses are covered. (Rules of Audit) If CC is sitting Governor Expenses are covered as Governor.

3- If sitting Governor - How selected

By vote of Council members

4- Does CC have a vote?

The CC has a vote only if he or she comes from the sitting Council. If the CC is a PDG then they have no vote.

5- Function

If the CC is a PDG then he or she serves as a facilitator.

6- Does MD have a PAID Sec/Admin, Asst?

The Multiple District of Kentucky does have a paid State Secretary. Their State Secretary oversees their State Convention and other things that the Council does not have time to do.

Feel that the State Secretary is invaluable when the right person has the job and gets along well with each Council and leaders from within the state.
