Report of the Council Chairperson:

Greetings from the 2017-2018 MD-31 Council of Governors. The Council looks forward to working closely with the North Carolina Lions, Inc.

The International Convention was tremendous. PDG Gwen White was elected to the International Board of Directors for 2017-2019. The DGE's were sworn in at the last Plenary Session and had their official first meeting for the election of positions. The Southeastern Breakfast was a large success with the largest attendance on record.

The State and last year's District Governors finished off with a tremendous year in June. Four (4) of the five (5) Districts finished over 1250 with a positive overall growth of 51 members. The total membership of our multiple district, as of July 1, was 6,356 Lions.

The new Lions year is already busy. Chairpersons have been appointed with a new position, Global Service Team, being started. This position will be responsible for assisting Clubs, Zones, Regions, and the Districts in enhancing Service projects and helping roll out Diabetes as the new global cause. Thankfully we are years ahead with our work on DAPS. They will also be responsible for assisting clubs in regular reporting service projects to LCI and ensuring that Legacy projects are ongoing. At the International Convention they informed the Council Chairs that they would have the added responsibility of being the Global Action Team Chair, which means that the Global Leadership, Global Membership and Global Service chairs report to the Council Chair.

Together, we face big challenges. Through July we are a negative forty seven (47) in membership. This may seem like a large number but it is not insurmountable. With hard work and dedication we can overcome any obstacles.

Through July on seventy four (74) of the three hundred and one (301) clubs have reported service activities that totaled almost 8,000 hours. Just imagine if all clubs reported their activities.

We are counting on all of the Lions of North Carolina to work with us to keep our organization strong. We are the Lions of North Carolina, and we will tackle this challenge together!!!

MSU Considerations

In 2016-17 we booked 104 screenings. In 2015-16 we booked 111 screenings. Our auditors estimate the annual program costs \$163,000 and based on these numbers that the breakdown cost per screening is around \$1500. Currently we charge the clubs \$150 per screening and made \$17,000 in 2016-17. Clubs pay approximately 10% of the cost to host a screening and the rest of the funds are allocated from Brighter Visions.

- 1. Cancellation Policy—would require a minimum of a 30 day notice of cancellation for a Lions Club to receive a refund. For the Lions Clubs that reserve a date and never cancel or send paperwork back in until having been called multiple times, they should be billed if they cancel under the 30 day time frame. Exceptions being (Natural Disaster/ Major Weather / Death of a club member) Just in the months of May and June 2017 we have had 4 cancellations. Two of these were 48 hours or less before the screening was to start. The other two were less than 3 weeks before the screening which in most cases does not allow another club time to utilize the date.
- 2. <u>Raising the MSU Fee for Clubs</u>— if we raise the fee some Lions Clubs may not be able to afford to host screenings, which is a valuable tool for getting the Lions into the community, and in turn, helps them get new members. There is a need to offset the cost or raise more BV funds.
- 3. <u>Last Minute Screenings</u>—scheduled within 60 days are not as well prepared or advertised as they should be but still think some cases are necessary. We typically book several school screenings each year with less than a months' notice but this is normally the exception on good attendance because of a captive audience. When a club books a last minute screening, we are unable to 'stack' multiple days for other nearby clubs to host as well which is how we best utilize our drive time and transportation costs.

Since we are only one month into the New Year there is very little to report. I do have a couple of items to bring to your attention.

Under UNRESTRICTED REVENUE, line items 3000 and 3001, Brighter Visions and Memorials/Honorariums. Actual is \$ 29,256 compared to budget of \$ 16,065. Great start of plus \$ 13,191. Great start to what we hope to be an indication of greater things to come.

One clarification. Last year camp revenue that was received in May-June for campers attending July-August was added back in August. This year those campers paying early funds were moved into July instead of August. It looks like we had a surplus of revenue by \$30,000 but this will even out next month. If you have further questions on this Hillary will be glad to answer those.

As of this report (time of writing) the PERMANENTLY RESSTRICTED ASSETS investments still reflect the decrease of \$ 369,462. The investment committee met Wednesday night. I do not know what our report will be, but you will be getting one.

STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT TO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON AUGUST 11, 2017

The Strategic planning committee last met on July 23, 2017 at Camp Dogwood to discuss developing the following recommendations to present to a caucus on SATURDAY SFTERNOON IN Cherokee;

By unanimous decision, it is the committee's recommendations that our By-Laws be revised as follows:

- Delete all committees except Nominating Committees and By-Laws Committee listed in Section 2
- II. Combine the following Committees and rename as follows
 - 1. Combine Sight and Hearing and Clinical Eye Research Committee under "Public Information Committee"
 - 2. Combine Volunteers Committee with Properties Committee and NAME IT "Properties and Volunteers Committee"
 - 3. Combine Fellowships and Partners with Brighter Visions Fund Raising Committee and name it "Fund Raising Committee"
 - 4. Create a new "NCLI Long Range Planning Committee"
- III. Retain the following Committees
 - 1. Budget and Finance Committee
 - 2. Camp Dogwood Committee
- IV. Place the above committees in a Policy Manual to be developed by the appropriate Committees and submitted to the Strategic Planning Committee for review before being presented to the Executive Committee and the Board for approval.

After discussing why we should make these recommendations, it was the consensus of all the committee members that we had to make some changes in the way we have been doing business if the NC Lions Inc. is to continue in the future. Their recommendations are based upon observations and performance results by the existing committees over the past few years. Their reasons are as follows:

- A. The 1st Vice District Governor has an enormous task in filling his/her District Chairs as promoted by Lions International and the State Constitution as well as filling the District appointments to the Committees listed in the NC Lions, Inc. By-Laws and as such, some (but not all) of the appointments to our committees have resulted in these Lions:
 - 1. Having no interest in serving on that committee or do not know that they have been appointed to the committee or
 - 2. Refuse to serve or even participate in a conference call or
 - 3. Their appointment was to satisfy a requirement of the By-Laws or
 - 4. They are not qualified to full fill their appointment as they know very little about the services provided by the NC Lions, Inc., and may have never visited Camp Dogwood to see what the Lions have to offer at Camp Dogwood.

- 5. We can relieve some of the pressure on the 1st VDG to find suitable Lions to fill all their appointments.
- B. If these recommendations are acceptable, Article X except for Section 11 will need to be revised.
- C. In addition it is our recommendation that Article IX be reworded similar to the following:
 - 1. Prior to District appointments to the above new Committees, the 1st Vice District Governor shall submit at least 2 suggested candidates for review and agreement by the 1st Vice District Governor and the Incoming President of North Carolina Lions, Inc. The second sentence should remain the same.

It was also brought up that our staff was having trouble when talking with outside entities about grants and partnerships getting across that Camp Dogwood was not the type of Camp associated with the Boy Scouts/Girl Scouts and other summer camps. Our facilities were far above what they may associate with these camps. After a period of discussion it was felt and wholly agreed upon that we should recommend the following for marketing purposes: It is our recommendation that we should change the name of "MEETING and RETREAT CENTER at CAMP DOGWOOD" to "DOGWOOD ON LAKE NORMAN".

This is to be used for marketing purposes as the Strategic Planning Committee is **not** recommending that we change the name of Camp Dogwood.

We are also recommending that consideration be given to the NC Lions Inc. having a secondary DBA as the "Brighter Visions Foundation"

These are the Committee recommendations that will be presented at the Caucus tomorrow, Saturday August 12, 2017 at 3:00 PM. It is our feeling that we should and need to get input and comments from our Lions prior to finalizing these recommendations to present at the November Board meeting.

I visited the Clinical Eye Research Department at Wake Forest Baptist Hospital this week and had the good fortune to meet and have a spontaneous conversation with Dr. Matthew Giegengack.

Our discussion soon centered on his extreme gratitude to Lions Clubs for their continued financial support that allows for state of the art equipment to treat those with diminished sight or is at risk for permanent blindness.

He shared his recent work in San Pedro Sula, Honduras at the Lion's Club Hospitale Fraternadad in June of this year. A team of eleven vision and eye care professionals, all affiliated in some way with Wake Forest Eye Center, performed 192 cataract surgeries and six cornea transplants during the eight day clinic. I have shared his power point of this work with you in a handout in front of you.

As we walked and talked, he pointed out to me the many recognition plaques that adoru the walls thanking Lions Clubs, individual Lions, and North Carolina Lions Multiple District 31.

I appreciate this totally unexpected visit with Dr. Giegengack. I highly recommend that each one in this room visit the Wake Forest Eye Center on the 6th floor of Wake Forest Medical Center. The professionals in this center are proud of their partner, Lions Clubs, and when you see the work Lions in this venue, you will be proud also.

As we continue to build awareness and ownership of the foundation to each and every member of Lions Clubs across our state, Hannah, Hillary and I will continue to create a better communication line for the sustainability and growth of our wonderful foundation. Plus, I will work with the Board of Directors in making sure our story reaches everyone throughout each district as officers is the catalyst for growth and communication.

Considerable progress has been made by our Development Officer Hannah Earnhardt in her short period of employment. This is where we are in communication and planning for today and tomorrow.

Website: We are continuing to make changes to the NCLI website in order to improve Lions and patron engagement. There have been some concerns regarding the Member Center login and logoff process. We are working closely with our web developer to discover the best option. We want the login/logoff process to be easy, but we also need to maintain proper security measures. The site was redesigned at the beginning of the year to properly highlight and showcase NCLI information for all web users. We will continue to provide modifications to the site to increase positive engagement.

Social Media: The NCLI Brighter Visions Facebook page is our most active social media account. Even though we have a Twitter account, we are still building our engagement with Lions Clubs across the state through Twitter. We have 833 followers on Facebook with an average of 630 daily impressions. We have an average of 77% response rate to our posts and most engagement takes place between 7-9 PM. Individuals interact most with the posts with the BV video, photos, and words of gratitude directed towards the Lions Clubs. With this said, our posts with photos generate the most overall engagement with an average reach of 250 individuals and 35 reactions per photo.

Printed Marketing: As we look towards improving our fundraising efforts as well as driving more individuals/groups/corporations to our meeting and retreat center in the off-season, we need new and improved marketing materials. We will look at creating pieces that share the need to know information and will drive individuals to our website for more. These pieces will include an infographic with statistics, tri-fold with snap shots and blurbs, and take-away pieces.

Advertisement: We will begin exploring the use of print and digital advertising especially Facebook marketing. We need to expand our reach to potential individual donors and businesses. We will assess the impact of advertisement in newspaper, magazine, banner ads, blog postings, and newsletters.

It's easy to be forgotten, that's why a continuous exposure and communication is the key for continued revenue and serving more of those less fortunate... It is our quest, and purpose.

I recently spoke to a district in our state and told the story about Mark Zuckerburg the founder of Facebook. He said find your purpose. Report of the Sight and Hearing Conservation Committee Sunday, August 13, 2017

First, I want to thank President George Suggs for the opportunity to serve as State Chair of the Sight and Hearing Conversation Committee this year. I hope I'm up to the challenge this opportunity presents. Secondly, I want to lay out for everyone to read, a distillation of Article X, Section 4, of the North Carolina Lions, Inc., By-Laws. Not everyone has a copy of the By-Laws laying around or wants to see what the Sight and Hearing Conservation Committee is supposed to do. But I think it's good every now and then to trot it out, dust it off and let it breathe a little. I won't read it to you verbatim. Instead, let me tell you the essence of this Committees mission.

- 1. The Committee is asked to encourage clubs to enter into a variety of activities with the blind and/or hearing impaired community, especially one-on-one involvement, informing them of the services available to them through the programs of the North Carolina Lions, Inc., the Division of Services for the Blind, and other agencies.
- 2. The Committee is also asked to promote public information and awareness of the problems of the hearing impaired, screening and early detection, collection of used hearing aids, and the use of Camp Dogwood and other types of recreation for the deaf and/or blind.
- 3. The Committee is also told it needs to promote the use of the Mobile Screening Unit by Lions Clubs throughout the State.
- 4. The Committee is then asked to assist in the selection and awarding the North Carolina Lions Educational Grants each year to worthy students of blind or visually impaired parent and/or parents, either living or deceased.
- 5. Last, but not least, the Committee is given the opportunity to educate both Lions Clubs and the general public on the humanitarian acts of organ and eye tissue donation for transplantation.

I strongly feel that this years District Sight and Hearing Conservation Committee Chairs are rearing to meet this opportunity head on.

Quite a few times in the past several years my club has found itself either short of funds for eye exams & glasses or that Matching Funds had evaporated late in the year. When that happens it's good to know that there other organizations available to assist us in our quest to aid the visually impaired.

We are not alone in providing services to the blind and visually impaired. District Committee Chairs need to educate themselves on the resources available outside of Lions and communicate this information to their Clubs via Zone and

Club meetings. That journey could begin with the following two sources I found last year:

Prevent Blindness North Carolina

Prevent Blindness North Carolina is a non-profit voluntary health agency dedicate to preventing blindness, preserving and restoring sight and promoting good vision to all. In collaboration with local and national partners, Prevent Blindness North Carolina administers four programs offering financial resources to applicants who qualify under the specific guidelines for each program. This organization operates in 36 counties and perform both preschool and adult vision screening programs. In 2015-2016, they screened 30,177 preschoolers and 5,825 adults. For adult screening dates, you should contact your local Senior Enrichment Center.

New Eyes. Since 1932, New Eyes has provided clear vision to over 8 million people in the United States and throughout the world. In a statement to the press the company said: "We purchase new prescription eyeglasses for U.S. residents in financial need and distribute used glasses to the disadvantaged in developing countries. Individuals cannot apply for themselves. The online application is only accessible to social service agencies who apply on their clients behalf.

On page 1, I listed one of the objectives of Sight and Hearing Conservation was the education of our Clubs and the public on the need for organ and eye tissue donations for transplantation. You may not be aware of it but Lions' role in organ and eye tissue procurement has changed over the years. When I joined Lions in 1987, collection of "eye wills" was a big service project all over the State. In fact, since the 1950's the Lions have been instrumental in educating the public of the need for donation The Lions played an important role in the early development

and growth of the North Carolina Eye Bank, by providing financial support. However, over the years our role has changed.

On November 14, 1999, the NCLF Board of Directors adopted the following position statement: "The North Carolina Lions Foundation shall be the education arm for the humanitarian acts of organ donation, procurement and transplantation of eye tissue."

This position statement recognizes the need not only to promote the donation of eye tissue but also promote the donation of other organs.

The passage of House Bill 1372 "The Heart Prevails" and the establishment of an online registry for donation have changed the way we need promote donation.

On October 1, 2007, House Bill 1372 "The Heart Prevails" legislation became law. The bill was introduced in April 2007, in order to convert the **heart-on-the-license symbol**, and those in the current DMV registry, to legal, first-person consent for organ and eye donation in North Carolina. Prior to passage of this legislation the heart on your driver's license only reflected your intention to be a donor. It is important to note that HB 1372 converts the heart-on-license and the correlating names in the donor registry to legal first person consent. This means that next-of-kin can not change a donor's decision.

Promoting Organ and Tissue Donation does not have to be an additional Service Project of your Club to take on. When you have other events such as sponsoring the Mobile Screening Unit or a fundraiser, have a table set up with literature on Organ and Tissue donation and simply make it available for people to pick up. This literature is available at every DMV office in the State. It is written in both English and Spanish.

And I for one don't even want to think about that and im sure the 800 plus VIP'S don't want to hear this either, Remember we are Lions and we don't Fail. So please encourage your clubs to sell and have your district chairs not wait for a call to give a program but to call clubs and say when can I come promote our states gem.

Brighter Visions Report - August 13, 2017 North Carolina Lions, Inc.

The districts have set their goals for Brighter Visions, and the goal for the multiple district is \$684,500. We have already had three successful kick offs, with the other two scheduled for later this month.

This year, President George is emphasizing service from Manteo to Murphy. So I have devised a simple graph to show our progress. With the goal of \$684,500 divided by the 600 miles across the state from Manteo to Murphy, each mile would account for \$1,141. As of Monday, August 7, we have traveled 34 miles, almost all the way from Manteo to Columbia. That's a good start!

I may not need to remind you that each year for the last seven years, we have reduced our statewide goal. Not only that, we have even missed meeting those lowered goals. We are at a serious time. We absolutely must meet our goals this year. Without doing that, we severely risk losing much of what identifies us as North Carolina Lions — Camp Dogwood, mobile screening unit, matching funds, and our other service projects. We cannot let that happen.

I have a challenge here for each governor, each board member, and each Brighter Visions Chair. At District L's kick off, they adopted a new fundraiser — they are going to sell tickets for a golf ball drop, and proceeds will go to Brighter Visions. My challenge is for each district to develop a new way of raising money for our VIPs. And I challenge you to do it now. Work with the first and second vice district governors, and anyone you can to get things under way right now. Time is passing. One twelfth of the year is already gone.

If you remember the space flight Apollo 13. The astronauts experienced some kind of important leak and reported, "Houston, we have a problem." Budget & Finance Report

The Budget & Finance Committee has several opportunities this year to improve the finances of the North Carolina Lions, Inc. The items that we will be initially looking at are as follows:

Review and recommend any changes to the 2017-2018 Budget

Brighter Visions revenue for 16-17 was \$553,930. This was \$41,455 less than the previous year and \$133,570 under budget. The budgeted amount for 17-18 is \$684,500. Based on previous years this is an unrealistic amount and adjustment need to be made.

Review and recommend changes to the format of our Financial Statements

Financial Statements should be clear, concise and easy for the Board to understand. Our current format has not been changed in over 25 years. They are difficult to read and can be misleading to our actual financial condition.

Work with the Properties Committee to ensure funding for needed repairs and improvements to our facilities.

Maintenance costs are increasing as our property ages. Many of our vehicles will need to be replaced in the near future. Current funding is not adequate to meet our needs.

Implement changes in Budget Hearings

The presentation of the 18-19 Budget will be held on Saturday, February 10, 2018 as part of the Board and Council weekend. Approval of the Budget will still take place at the May Board Meeting.
