Sorry we had a little delay with the LCIF/VSP Vouchers but our supplier LCIF ran out along with us. Thank you for your patience, they are back in stock now and we are now filling orders again. North Carolina is one of many states that receives the vouchers from LCIF/VSP program and now issuing nearly 100 per month. This LCIF/VSP Program is much bigger and easier on our clubs than the old Matching Funds program. Please take time vetting the recipients so it can speed up the process.

I reported about New Bern and Twin Rivers Lions Clubs assisting Garber Methodist Church of New Bern with their Faith in Action Vision Clinic last month. The Lions were armed with the KidSight equipment along with District 31N KidSight Operator 2nd VDG Gene Goetz. The total screened that Saturday was 270 with 250 pairs of glasses supplied to the patients. This is an advertised screening that draws recipients from several surrounding counties. Requirements for patients are no insurance and in need of vision care. All doctors are volunteers and the vision specialists provide follow-up to those in need at no cost. The Lions of New Bern, Aurora and Kinston assisted Garber Church volunteers that do so much

We have a gorgeous camp for our North Carolina Visually Impaired People. In fact, It's the best available in Southeastern United States. We all should be proud of our camp.

Along with being "The best" comes the responsibility to maintain the facility. That responsibility falls on the Lions of North Carolina through the sale of Camp Dogwood Raffle tickets. The income from the sale of camp dogwood raffle tickets goes exclusively to support the maintenance needs of our camp. Supplies such as, tires for golf carts, mulch, screws, nails, bolts, paint, cleaning supplies, gutters on our buildings. These items are all necessary, and as we are all aware those costs increase every year.



Many of our members and clubs buy the tickets themselves, this year we would like to see more of the tickets sold to members of the community. Each club was given extra books this year. Our hope is that you will ask for help from the community and sell them to the public. Last month our club set up an information booth at a church festival and sold 10 books, it's not a windfall but every \$100 helps. If your club has a booth at a fair or you're selling brooms, why integrate camp dogwood raffle tickets into your fundraiser?

Our maintenance budget at camp dogwood is \$150,000. Please remember that the money currently raised is also the money available to pay the current bills so, please send the funds raised to NCLF as soon as possible.

Let's try to get, not only Lions members, but the citizens of North Carolina to help us keep the camp we love so much in great shape.

Enhancing the Quality of Life for Our Citizens in North Carolina



Fellow Lions,

Did you know that every year approximately 63,124 North Carolinians are diagnosed with diabetes? This is only a small part of the 1,014,358 plus people in N.C. that have been diagnosed with diabetes. Approximately 5% of diabetics suffer from vision loss or vision impairment. Five percent doesn't sound like a lot but when you do the math that is a total of 50,717 people state wide that experience some type of visual impairment directly related to diabetes.

So many people suffer from diabetes and go undiagnosed. We have a program we are wanting to launch for the summer of 2024 at Camp Dogwood. We are wanting to offer every VIP attending 2024 Summer Camp the opportunity to receive a FREE A1C test. The A1C test is a simple blood test that

How the A1C Test Works O1 Glucose attaches itself to hemoglobin in blood cells for up to 3 months O2 A1C test measures the percentage of hemoglobin coated in sugar A1C level below 5.7% is considered normal

measures your average blood sugar levels over the past 3 months. So, while it is important to measure your blood sugar regularly to see how much sugar is in your blood at any given time, measuring your A1C gives you a more definitive look at whether your blood sugar levels have been on track over the last two to three months.

If given the opportunity we would like to purchase A1C test kits to make testing available to each VIP attending Summer Camp 2024. We have found that testing will run approximately \$15 per person. If you or your club have any questions or would like to assist Camp Dogwood with this project please let me know.

Diabetes Awareness



North Carolina ranks relatively high among states in terms of the prevalence of diabetes. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), North Carolina has one of the highest rates of diabetes in the United States, with an estimated 14% of the adult population living with the disease. This puts North Carolina in the top 20 states for diabetes prevalence.

Additionally, North Carolina has a high rate of childhood obesity, which increases the risk of developing type 2 diabetes in adulthood. The state also has a significant rural population, who may face barriers to accessing healthcare and diabetes education and management resources. These factors contribute to the high incidence of diabetes in North Carolina.
