Remarks by State Council Chairperson

George Suggs, Council Chair

Council Chair Report

The governor's meetings to help start their year off right. We went through and compared the committees with the Lions International and the state constitution and bylaws and worked with the constitution and bylaw committees to align with each other. Each committee has guide lines and will be distributed. The governors are asking on the reports this year to please tell what is happening across the state with your assigned committee and not to give a program to them but to give a report.

On September 26th, 2024, Hurricane Helene made land fall In the Big Ben region of Florida as a category 4 with winds of 140 MPH. It weakened quickly as it moved quickly across land. Before degenerating into a Post Tropical cyclone over Tennessee on September 27th . It stalled over the state before dissipating on September 29th. In doing so Helene had managed to kill 232 People and \$88 Billion worth of damage across 8 states. North Carolina had 101 Verified in North Carolina alone. We had 1 in Ashe County, 5 in Avery County, 43 in Buncombe County, 1 in Burke County, 1 in Catawba county, 2 in Clevland County, 1 in Gaston County, 5 in Haywood county, 9 in Henderson county, 2 in Macon County, 4 in Madison County, 1 in Mcdowel county, 3 in Mecklenburg county, 2 in Mitchell county, 1 in Polk County, 1 in Rowan county, 4 in Rutherford county, 1 in Wake county, 2 in Watauga county, 1 in Wilkes county, 1 in Yadkin county, and 10 in Yancey County. Buncombe county still has 26 missing. This shows how widespread this was. Think of the things that this changed. As an example, Baxter International in Marion had to shut down for a period causing a shortage and rationing of IV Fluids nationwide. Baxter supplies 60% of IV fluids to the US. This Hurricane was so widespread it caused 15 Tornadoes on the north side of Rocky Mount damaging 14 buildings and injuring 15 people including 4 critical. The area in Black Mountain and Swannanoa suffered loss of life and totally took out a town. Garren Creek in Fairview did as well. Haywood county took a hit again in the Clyde area where just a few years ago it was destroyed by another hurricane. Chimney Rock, Batcave, Pensacola in Yancy, Marshall and Hot springs in Madison County just to name a few.

Folks were without Electricity, Telephones, Intranet, Water and even gas. Grocery stores were taking cash only not cards because of no intranet or power. Folks were flushing toilets with water from the branch.

Only a few Stores were open, and the products were scarce. We cooked on a Colman propane stove and still ate on paper plates and plastic forks and spoons. Asheville and surrounding towns had curfews to keep folks off the road.

The storms caused 1,400 landslides and damaged over 160 water and sewer systems, at least 6,000 miles of roads, more than 1,000 bridges and culverts and an estimated 126,000 homes. This storm crested the French broad river at 25 feet beating the record from the floods of 1916. Lions' clubs from all over the US have sent donations in cash to items folks can use to rebuild their lives. Many are still, after one month, still living in tents. So far just in the mountains in Asheville we have collected 11 tractor and trailer loads of goods to transport out to the areas of need. We have utilized 3 helicopter drops and even used horseback to get items to those in need. We how to cook on little Buddy heaters. We have given out over 300 little buddy heaters. We even had a 53 foot trailer come in with 572 weber grills and another with 1800 bags of charcoal.

While each international president brings their unique passion and perspective to Lions Clubs International, there has and always will be a single constant that unites all lions: and that is Service. With this each president is committed to helping clubs increase their service, and as a result, their impact on our local and global communities grow and provide service to those less fortunate.

President Fabricio Oliveira "Make Your Mark"

He says that Bound by kindness and driven by the desire to create a better world, Lions club members are making their mark in communities everywhere. And fellow Lions I have been very impressed with the lions' clubs across the globe that have reached out to us to help in our time of need. We received a \$100,000 grant from the Lions International Foundation to assist in our situation. We have had 2 meetings with the committee and will give more details as they come available. Right now, it's working to find what we need to focus on.

The impact of Hurricane Helene was felt all across the region. I want each of you to know that NC Lions Camp Dogwood immediately went to work.

We opened the facility to those needing shelter in their time of need. We also were blessed and honored to provide rooms for the helicopter pilots that flew air drop and search and rescue missions. In total 48 nights of accommodations were donated for this cause.

Lions from all over the United States have truly stepped up the past few weeks to assist with Hurricane Relief. As of November 1^{st,} we have received \$129,233 in donations. We have dispersed \$57,087 in supplies and expenses. I hope each of you have been following the posts on Facebook documenting the tragedies we have seen over the past few weeks.

Animal Rescue – 3 deliveries- food and kennels

Andrews Lions Food Bank- 1 delivery 14 pallets assorted

Lake Lure Food Bank- misc. food items

See the 21st Century Mobile Screening Programs Committee Statewide Chairperson Report, November 10, 2024

Members of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors, I'm pleased to provide this report on behalf of the Mobile Screening Programs Committee. The vision screening data that I'm providing today will be from July through September and some for October

I believe it's important in these reports to focus on all three mobile screening programs operated by NCLF and our local Lions Clubs. These are the: (1) NCLF KidSight Program using the district-based KidSight Units, (2) the NCLF Mobile Screening Program using the MSU, and (3) the KidSight USA mobile screening program as conducted by local clubs using their own equipment – their cameras.

- (1) Screening <u>using the MSU</u> operated by Bryan Hoover, continues to be robust. During the first quarter, the MSU conducted 12 screenings of 259 adults and 41 children. They identified 147, or 49%, to be in need of a complete eye examination. In addition, 230 hearing screenings were provided.
- (2) Next are KidSight USA screenings conducted by clubs using their own equipment (and often using their own procedures and forms). Based on the reports submitted by those clubs, during the first quarter, they screened 2,199 children and referred 400, or 18%, for complete eye exams. Some clubs also screened adults, though that practice with the PlusOptix and SPOT cameras is contrary to NCLF guidance. Some of these screenings are conducted without an appropriate number of KidSight USA Certified Screeners, and there isn't much external program oversight.
- (3) Now to the NCLF KidSight Program, which means results <u>using the District-based KidSight Units</u>. The first quarter was slow. Only 6 clubs used the KSUs to conduct 10 days of screenings. Children screened with the KSUs totaled 1,085. Those screenings resulted in the referral of 149, or 14%, of the children for complete eye exams.

The total number of children screened was 3,225, with 563 (17%), referred.

The "early" results for October show a <u>strong uptick</u> in screenings, both with the KSUs and by Clubs with their own cameras. In fact, we already have reports showing screening of 6,388 children with the KSUs and 3,106 by the clubs --- for a very strong total of 6,388 children!! If the children screened during the first four months is about 9,600, then the annualized number is less than 29,000. Far less than the nearly 48,000 last year!

The biggest challenges in the KidSight programs continue to be:

- Insufficient number of clubs that are "screening clubs", and clubs not collaborating to screen
- Lack of training sessions, both in-person and via Zoom
- Program guidance on specific screening topics has been lacking
- Substantial deficit in using KidSight Units; Increasing tendency of clubs to purchase cameras
- Insufficient number of KidSight Certified Screeners and KidSight Unit Operators
- Lack of effective follow-up about "referred" children and the reporting thereof
- Lack of an organized, well-planned approach to secure approval from school systems

The primary program goal areas for this year continue to be:

- Marketing and Communications (with support from Lion Bledsoe's committee)
- Training: in-person and via Zoom, including at conventions and cabinet meetings
 - KidSight USA Screener Certification & how to properly use the cameras
 - How to organize and conduct contacts with potential screening facilities & schools
 - How to Plan and Conduct Screenings in various venues/facilities
- Recruitment and development of additional KSU Operators
- Adding new "screening clubs" in all districts
- Putting in place procedures for conducting follow-up for "referred" children
- Conducting "pilot" initiatives in the KidSight screening program area across districts

The Committee is making progress on several of these program goals, albeit not as rapidly as we would like. One marketing approach we will undertake is to have a Vision Screening table at the Mid-Winters, and we will offer <u>individual</u> sessions with clubs that want to discuss vision screening.

Attached are several reports that will allow you to look at the screening results in greater detail.

NC State Lions Sight & Hearing Conservation Report – November 2024

Several Lions from NC visited Miracles in Sight in Winston-Salem on Saturday Sept 14. Miracles In Sight (MIS), one of the largest nonprofit eye banks in the world, has launched a capital campaign to help recover from a 2022 flood in its local facility. Now in its public phase, funds raised in the \$5 million dollar campaign will be used to purchase, remodel, and upfit a new facility in Clemmons, and will run through the end of 2025. Those of us attending were given a tour of their present facilities and Ingrid Schunder, CEO, dissected a donated human eye to demonstrate the intricacies of the human eye. Miracles in Sight procures, processes, and stores corneal tissue from all over the state. They in turn supply corneal tissue not only to surgeons in the USA but to several other countries. Miracles in Sight supports corneal research so that surgical ophthalmologists have the latest technology relating to corneal surgeries and treatments. They partner with Vital Tears which produces autologous corneal tears for clients requiring this type of treatment.

NORTH CAROLINA LIONS FOUNDATION, INCORPORATED

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

- **Section 4:** The corporate powers of the North Carolina Lions Foundation, Incorporated shall be vested in the Board of Directors.
 - C. No member of the Board of Directors or elected officer is entitled to receive any salary for serving as a Board of Directors member or an elected officer from the North Carolina Lions Foundation, Incorporated.
 - D. No member of the Board of Directors or elected officer shall be entitled to receive any salary <u>as an employee</u> from the North Carolina Lions Foundation, Incorporated.
