Miracles In Sight receives \$50,000 grant from NC Lions Foundation to assist with research



CLEMMONS, N.C. (Sept. 24, 2025) – Miracles In Sight (MIS) recently received a \$50,000 grant from the North Carolina Lions Foundation to fund the purchase of two ophthalmic instruments to assist the nonprofit with research. The grant is made possible by additional support from the A.J. Fletcher Foundation and matched by Lions Clubs International Foundation.

As one of the largest nonprofit eye banks in the world, MIS specializes in the preparation, preservation, and distribution of donated ocular tissue. In close collaboration with ophthalmologists and researchers, MIS ensures timely and secure transport of this tissue, helping patients regain sight through life-changing corneal transplants and groundbreaking research.

The equipment will be used for enhanced imaging capabilities for tissue analysis, digital imaging and data integration, and training and skills development aligning with the organization's continued research goals.

"This new and innovative equipment is critical in the ever-changing research needs for preserving this pivotal tissue for successful corneal transplantation," said Ingrid Schunder, president and CEO of MIS. "This new state of the art equipment will allow MIS to continue its missions of offering a wide range of services, including research and collaboration with innovation partners to advance corneal transplant procedures." An SL-D4 slit lamp is a digital-ready ophthalmic diagnostic device that serves as a conventional biomicroscope and a digital imaging platform. The slit lamp can be used as a standard examination instrument or connected to a digital camera to create a comprehensive digital imaging system. MIS will use the slit lamp for various research projects involving tissue analysis.

At MIS, the MORIA Evolution 3E technology will play an important role in clinical application and research initiatives. The device allows for the study and improvement of corneal tissue preparation techniques, which can lead to improved outcomes in transplantation and broader advancements in ophthalmic care.

The North Carolina Lions Foundation collaborated with private and public donors, including the A.J. Fletcher Foundation, to raise \$25,000, which was matched by a \$25,000 grant from the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

"Eye research has taken a dramatic turn over the years, and NC Lions club members and Lions Clubs International Foundation are excited about the possibilities that can be discovered through the use of cutting-edge equipment used at Miracles In Sight," said Carlton Metts, executive director for the NC Lions Foundation. "Two of our North Carolina Lions members come to mind after successful cornea transplants: one less than a year ago and the other back in the 90s. Lions have been involved with many research programs but this one with MIS feels like helping a family member."

Kindness Matters... Mental Health & Well Being



Mental health touches every family and every community. The leadership team of District 31-O is proud to launch our first District 31-O Mental Health & Well-Being Week, October 4–11, 2025. This initiative reflects our commitment to raising awareness, educating, reducing stigma, and ensuring that no one feels alone in their journey toward mental health well-being. By working together, we can provide hope, encouragement, and resources that strengthen resiliency in both individuals and communities.

As part of District 31-O's Mental Health Initiative, we will host the Kellin Foundation's Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) course on October 6, 2025, from 9: 00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. This will be conducted in person at the Sanford Lions Clubhouse.

Just as traditional first aid equips us to respond to physical health emergencies, Mental Health First Aid provides the tools to recognize, understand, and respond to

signs of mental health and substance use challenges. This evidence-based training helps participants learn how to support someone in crisis until professional help is available.

The Kellin Foundation, a nationally recognized nonprofit based in Greensboro, North Carolina, is committed to building resilient children, families, and communities. Through their MHFA training, participants gain practical strategies for:

- Identifying common signs and symptoms of mental health challenges
- Approaching and supporting someone who may be in crisis
- Knowing when and how to connect individuals to professional care and resources
- Reducing stigma by fostering compassionate, informed conversations

As District Governor, I want to emphasize the importance of this training as part of our service mission: "Mental health is a vital part of overall well-being. By learning these skills, Lions and community members can provide support in critical moments—just as we would if someone were experiencing a physical health emergency."

To further support this initiative, District 31-O will host a district-wide Question & Answer session via Zoom on Monday, October 6 at 6:00 p.m. Dr. Kelly Graves, founder of the Kellin Foundation, and Ashely Cox, Clinical Director of Youth Focus, a Greensboro nonprofit, that also works to strengthen community well-being through housing, counseling, and crisis services for youth and families, will be our guest presenters. This interactive session will give Lions across the district the opportunity to ask questions and share ideas on how to apply these skills in our clubs and communities.

The Mental Health First Aid course is offered free to 30 participants who are interested in counseling and mental health. The Zoom discussion is open to all Lions, Leos, and community members. By participating, we are not only strengthening our own understanding but also helping to create a culture of care, compassion, and resilience across District 31-O.

I strongly encourage every club across the state to maximize its participation in scheduling events across their district. Together, we can demonstrate the power of Lions service—showing that we are not only champions of sight, hearing, and hunger relief, but also of mental health and well-being. Together, we can make a difference—one conversation, one connection, and one act of support at a time.

Eliza Park & the NC Lions Veterans Initiative

Written to Inform, Inspire, and Strengthen Lionism in Action

From Biscuits to a Movement



What began almost two years ago with a bag of biscuits under an overpass has grown into the Eliza Park Homeless Initiative—a model of service, dignity, and transformation. Over 2,100 volunteer hours and \$17,000 of personal savings have already been invested to create a chartered encampment that resembles its own functioning community government.

This work entered a new chapter in August 2025, when Lion Paul Geigel joined the NC Lions Veterans Initiative. Together with Lion Michael Hall and others, Eliza Park and

ROOTS have become part of a growing statewide effort to serve homeless veterans and restore dignity to those who once served our nation.

Veterans at the Center

In Raleigh's encampments, veterans live side by side with civilians—a reminder that homelessness touches every corner of our community. Many veterans face unique barriers to recovery, but they also bring leadership, resilience, and skills that can transform their camps into structured, peer-led communities.

The NC Lions for Veterans program works to:

- Advocate for housing and recovery pathways
- Assist with peer-led recruitment and leadership development
- Support encampments with practical resources—generators, stable infrastructure, and community investor partnerships
- Ensure veterans and their families are honored, supported, and equipped for reintegration

Lions for Veterans Initiative

Lion MSG (Ret.) Michael J. Hall

The Lions for Veterans Initiative is led in North Carolina by Lion MSG (Ret.) Michael J. Hall, who brings both his military service and his Lions service together in a mission to support veterans across our state.

Goals for Lions for Veterans:

- · Advise, assist, and recruit veterans into the Lions network.
- Build data and pathways for veteran support across North Carolina.
- Strengthen partnerships with civic, faith, and peer-led community groups.

A veteran is defined as someone who has served at least 24 months in the U.S. military and received an honorable discharge. In 2023, North Carolina had an estimated 700,000 veterans, roughly 8% of the state's population. Of these, 218,200 had a service-related disability rating, alongside 10 military installations and nearly 90,000 active-duty personnel.

Yet the need remains pressing: in 2024, 688 homeless veterans were identified in North Carolina, of which 23% were unsheltered. Many face challenges related to PTSD, substance abuse, and barriers in accessing federal benefits.

Lion Hall's leadership is guided by both data and compassion. His partnership with Lion Paul Geigel in September 2025 connected the Lions for Veterans Initiative directly with the Eliza Park Homeless Initiative, a peer-led encampment model in the Garner area. This has resulted in the establishment of a chartered, structured encampment, where veterans and civilians alike are supported with dignity, leadership, and recovery pathways.

By connecting veterans living in tents with resources such as CASH stipends, PTSD counseling, substance abuse recovery, and VA partnerships, the Lions for Veterans Initiative ensures that no veteran is left behind.

Lion Michael J. Hall is new to this partnership, but his commitment is strong. Together with Lion Paul Geigel and the Eliza Park team, the Lions for Veterans Initiative is shaping a new model of service, outreach, and veteran reintegration in North Carolina.

Core Objectives of Lionism in Action

- Hunger: Weekly hot meals, groceries, and supplies are served to hundreds in need.
- Environment: Through the ROOTS work program, over 10,000 pounds of trash have been removed from parks and encampments, making Raleigh cleaner and greener.
- Disaster Relief: Structured encampments create safety and dignity in times of crisis.
- Volunteers: Lions and community members work side by side, embodying 'We Serve.'
- Homeless Outreach: Peer-led, city-recognized models are pioneering new pathways to housing, recovery, and long-term stability.

Lions in Action: Community Transformation

Eliza Park is more than a weekly meal or cleanup effort—it is a living model of community transformation. By working with the City of Raleigh, Wake County Continuum of Care, and local civic partners, Lions are showing how grassroots efforts can create systemic change.

With Lions supporting veterans, ROOTS leading cleanups, and Eliza Park bridging agencies to people, we are proving that the heart of Lionism beats strongest in service to the most vulnerable.
